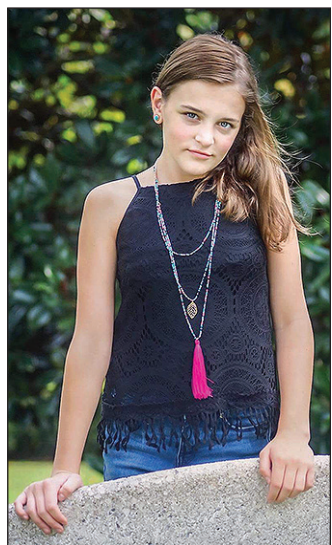

Taylor Eagan will be an eighth-grader at St. Roch Catholic school in the fall, but she will learn plenty this summer being an emcee at the CMA Showcase.

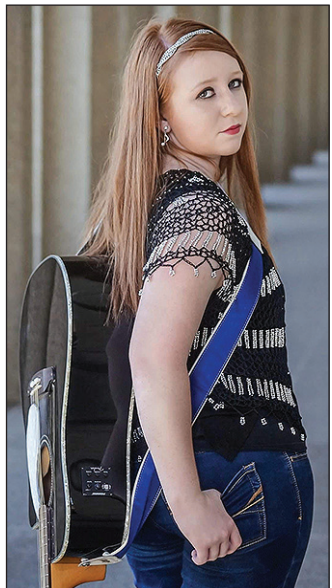
"I will be singing four songs and also announcing people as they come on stage, helping them get off stage, making sure they are ready to get on stage," Taylor said.

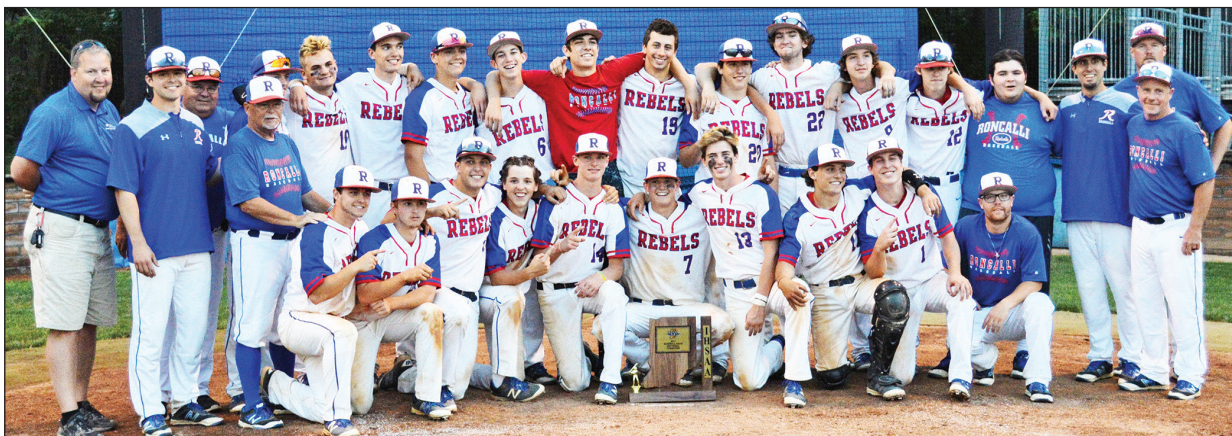

## Rebels, Saints advance to regionals

Roncalli's baseball team is growing accustomed to having a target on its backs as defending 4A state champions.

The Rebels continued their title defense Monday by defeating Southport 5-1 for their third sectional trophy since moving up to 4A in 2012. Earlier Monday, Roncalli shut out Perry Meridian 6-0 behind pitcher Colton Panaranto, who allowed only four hits and struck out 12.

"Every team we have played brings their best against us," Roncalli coach Aaron Kroll said. "Southport certainly did that (because) they didn't give up. They kept fighting. In most

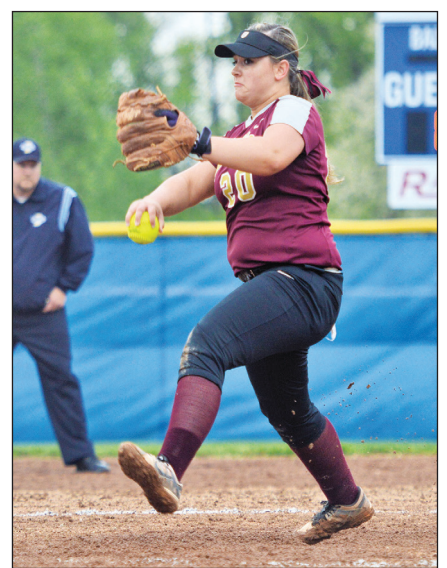
games we have been able to respond. You get this far and anything can happen."

For the second straight season the Rebels have reached the Sweet 16. They will face Avon at 10 a.m. Saturday at the Decatur Central Regional with the winner facing Cathedral or Greenfield in the championship game at 6 p.m.

Roncalli junior standout Nick Schnell slammed a three-run homer that sparked a five-run first inning. He also pitched, allowing just five hits and striking out the side in the seventh.

"Just to get rolling and pitching with that kind of lead makes it a lot easier on everybody," Schnell said. "We were able to relax and play loose."

Panaranto and Mark Cobb each drove in a run in the first.



Lutheran senior pitcher Kimberly Kuehr and the Saints won three straight games to repeat as sectional champions on their home diamond. Lutheran blasted its opponents by a combined score of 42-1.

Roncalli infielders uncharacteristically committed three errors in the sixth, which spoiled Schnell's shutout. Two throwing errors allowed Southport senior Chris Cox to score. Cox went 3-for-3.

After giving up five runs and four hits in

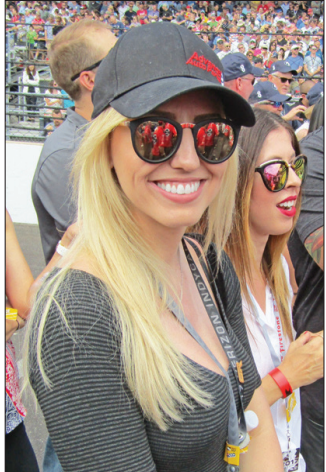

**Kiritis and Me: Enduring 63 Hours at Gunpoint**

In February 1977 an angry Tony Kiritis wired Dick Hall to a saved-off shotgun and paraded him through Downtown Indianapolis before holding him hostage for three days.  
Forty years later, Hall (with co-writer Lisa Hendrickson) tells his side of the story in "Kiritis and Me: Enduring 63 Hours at Gunpoint."  
Tom Cochran's foreword sets the stage for reading Hall's memoir. As a young radio reporter working for Fred Heckman at WIBC-AM, Cochran reported on the evolving situation.  
Hall's memoir first tells how Kiritis walked into a meeting and took him hostage. Then he backtracks to the past, telling a bit about the lives of his parents and describing the family business.  
The primer on the business and how it was operated is essential to understanding the business relationships between the Hall family and Kiritis and how that relationship dissolved. From the onset of the situation, Hall wondered why Kiritis was so angry. Since the memoir is from Hall's perspective, no one ever learns what caused the anger.  
Hall, who was raised on the Near Northside, tells the story of his life clearly and succinctly. He was involved in family, church, school and athletic endeavors and graduated from Shortridge High School and Purdue.  
As in many families of that time period, Hall's family was reserved with little open show of affection and emotion. He has carried that trait throughout life, and it is evident in the book.  
Over the years he has hardly spoken about those three days, but he recognized that his is a story that needs to be told.  
He also expresses his perplexity as to why by the time of the trial and its aftermath, so many people considered Kiritis the victim who deserved their cheers.

# Beech Grove names Winton top teacher

Best known for his 2016 walk across America to raise money for Helping Hands for Freedom, a veterans organization, Beech Grove Middle School eighth-grade math teacher Kevin Winton has been named Teacher of the Year by the Beech Grove High School Association.

Mr. Winton is known too for his excellence in the classroom. He loves teaching math, and everyone at the school knows that. He is a wonderful role model, and all of his students enjoy having him as a teacher. He makes learning fun and incorporated math into his walk by letting students know how many steps it would take to make a mile.

Not only is Mr. Winton a superb instructor, he also stresses how important it is for his students to set goals and work to achieve them. He is being honored for his unique way of reaching his students and showing them that life – like math – starts with the first step.

"I'm seeing my second generation of students," the 30-year teacher (29 at Beech Grove) said. "It's rewarding to see my former students doing so well in their family lives and careers."

Winton and his walking partner, Indianapolis police detective David Roth, set out on their journey April 28 when departing Atlantic City, N.J., on historic U.S. Route 40 with their destination being San Francisco.

Their journey – known as the Route for the Brave – took them 3,091 miles across 14 states in four months, during which time Mr. Winton wore out 13 pairs of shoes and numerous socks. They averaged between 3 and 4 mph and 20 to 25 miles a day, six days a week.

Their training began in the summer of 2015 by walking much of Route 40 in Indiana. They normally walked twice a day, covering anywhere from 8 to 16 miles. Winton once logged 35 miles on a Sunday – a round-trip jaunt from his Acton home to Downtown Indianapolis.

"The people I met as we walked across Indiana were extraordinary and truly amazing," Mr. Winton said before his trek across the United States. "The stories shared as we stopped at various small communities were fascinating. It is impossible to describe the sunrise over the soybean fields near Spiceland."

"The number of hawks was too numerous to count, but the bald eagle flying along the White River and then perching on the old Washington Street Bridge was one incredible sight. I had no idea how invigorating walking would be. I can't begin to imagine the majestic views we will have over our venture," said Winton, who coaches the school's Academic Pursuit team, which won the 2016 Marion County tournament.

His daughters, Kathryn, Jessica and Elizabeth, all of whom are college students and graduates of Franklin Central High, and Laura Williams, now his fiancée, provided him a great amount of support.

Also big backers were his parents, Jim and Sue, who live in Acton on a farm that has been in Sue's family since 1842.

# Brian Bosma named Alumnus of the Year

Brian C. Bosma, House speaker of the Indiana General Assembly, has been named Beech Grove High School's Alumnus of the Year.

Bosma, who graduated in 1976, was first elected in 1996 to represent House District 88, which encompasses the northeast portion of Marion County, a part of southern Hamilton County and the western part of Hancock County.

As a Republican leader in the Statehouse, Bosma's record of reform is unparalleled. His time is marked by significant policy achievements, which turned Indiana in a new direction over the past decade.

The speaker has opened floor proceedings and committee meetings to Hoosiers via the internet while tightening the legislative ethics rules. House GOP members also championed Major Moves, Indiana's landmark highway funding plan that

resulted in the construction of I-69 and the Ohio River bridges.

Bosma, who will be honored Saturday, June 10, during the Beech Grove Alumni Association's annual awards dinner, said he is a strong advocate for school choice, and he championed the state's strong charter school system, giving families of limited financial means school choice scholarships.

In 2012 he led the charge to make Indiana the 23rd Right to Work state in the nation, and in 2013 he and House Republicans championed the passage of the largest tax cut package in state history. He has spearheaded 13 tax cuts in the last decade while maintaining the state's strong reserves and AAA credit rating, making Indiana the fiscal envy of the nation.

Bosma is a founding director of Bosma Industries for the Blind, which employs more than 125 blind and visually impaired Hoosiers statewide. He has practiced law at the Indianapolis firm of Kroger, Gardis & Regas for 30 years, where he focuses on local government and environmental law.

Mr. Winton was thankful for all the telephone calls and texts that Beech Grove teachers and friends sent him along the way of his ocean-to-ocean walk.

The money that he and Roth raised will be used to construct a retreat home for military families.

Reflecting on his walk, Winton commented, "I cannot describe my emotions of the walk and especially the many families of veterans who told us their stories of bravery. We were able to share their personal pride, grief and sorrow in losing loved ones all along the way. Many of their comments will not be forgotten."

Mr. Winton had always wanted to embark upon a project that would have a lasting impression. His inspiration came from a quote by John Bunyan that he ran across while writing a paper for a theology and literature class at Franklin College: "You have not lived today until you have done something for someone who can never repay you."

"I am hoping the Route for the Brave will have an impact on numerous people for years to follow," Winton said.

The Acton resident, a deacon at New Bethel Baptist Church, was awestruck by the beauty of the land and the unity of the people across the United States.

"The beauty is beyond description. And the openness of the people has been uplifting particularly at the end of the walk on many days."

The sights and hospitality were incredible: They were followed by deer down a mountain peak in Maryland and the Appalachian Trail; seeing the grandeur of Siding Hill in western Maryland; pausing at the Flight 93 Memorial in Shanksville, Pa.; enjoying the hospitality of New Bethel Baptist Church on the Southside; standing in an arch of a section of the Berlin Wall in Missouri; speaking at Chapman (Mo.) United Methodist Church; reaching the Berthound Pass and crossing the Continental Divide; seeing the sun rise above the Rocky Mountains; and crossing the Golden Gate Bridge and seeing the San Francisco Bay.

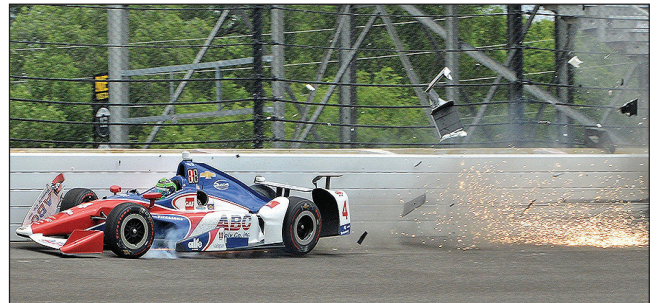

## Reinbold sees abrupt end in Indy 500

IndyCar team owner Dennis Reinbold had just one word Sunday for the outcome of Dreyer & Reinbold driver Sage Karam in the 101st Indianapolis 500.

"Disappointing," said Reinbold, after the No. 24 Mecum Auctions Dallara/Chevrolet stopped suddenly in the first turn on lap 126.

Karam was steadily moving through the pack for his second top-10 finish for Reinbold. Karam started 21st and was up to 12th just a few laps before his fourth 500 ended abruptly.

Reinbold was the first to believe that a faulty alternator resulted in placing 28th and the end of a problem-filled race.

Shortly after the race started, Reinbold realized that Karam could hear him but that he could not hear his driver due to a malfunction when his driver's microphone failed. It forced the team to communicate with Karam through code and hand signals during pit stops for car adjustments.

"We had an alternator let go and there was nothing we could do," Karam said. "I thought we ran a smart race ... I just wanted to finish the whole race."

"We had a top-10 car today. I was driving smart, and I was as calm as I could be. It's unfortunate when something out of your control happens and you can't fix it."

The Indy 500 is the only Verizon IndyCar series race this season for Reinbold, a Greenwood auto dealership owner.

### How close?

Three-time Indy 500 winner Helio Castroneves missed his fourth win Sunday when he lost to first-time winner Takuma Sato by about one-fifth of a second. Castroneves led with six laps to go before Sato passed him to become the first Japanese driver to win the 500.

Castroneves has three runners-up finishes and has missed being a six-time winner by a combined time of less than six-tenths of a second.

One of five Team Penske drivers in the field, Castroneves had a harrowing day. The 42-year-old driver drove under Scott Dixon's airborne car on Lap 53 and later barely missed being collected in another accident later.

A rear winglet and front wing were broken on the No. 2 Shell Pennzoil Chevrolet when Castroneves drove onto the grass inside the south chute to avoid Dixon's horrendous crash.

He was later assessed a drive-through penalty for jumping the restart on Lap 75, which ultimately cost him the win.

"I would like to see some reviews," Castroneves said afterward. "Hopefully they can convince me that I jumped the start. I had a good start. They call green and I went."

In the final five laps he could not track down Sato, contending that his tires were wearing down.

"Finishing second again sucks," Castroneves said. "So close to get the fourth. I really am trying. I will not give up on this dream. I know it will happen."

His previous Indy 500 wins came in 2001, '02 and '09, each with team owner Roger Penske.

### Pit notes

- Sato won the Indy 500 in his eighth start, his first with Andretti Autosport. Sato had never finished among the top 10 at Indy, although he crashed into the first turn on the last lap while trying to overtake leader Dario Franchitti in 2012.

- This was the fifth Indy 500 win for team owner Michael Andretti, tying him with Chip Ganassi. Andretti's drivers have won three of the last four races.

- The race was red-flagged after the Jay Howard-Dixon crash. Dixon's airborne car punched a hole in the south chute fence. Dixon called it a wild ride.

- Veteran crew chief Johnny O'Gara served as race strategist and son Andy O'Gara, each from Beech Grove, was team manager for rookie Zach Veach, who completed 155 laps before being sidelined with a 26th-place finish. Andy O'Gara's wife, nine-time Indy 500 driver Sarah Fisher, drove the pace car during caution periods.

- Voters for 500 Rookie of the Year were gaga over two-time Formula One champion Fernando Alonso, who started fifth, led 27 laps and completed 179 laps before engine failure. Dale Coyne's rookie driver Ed Jones started 11th and finished third.

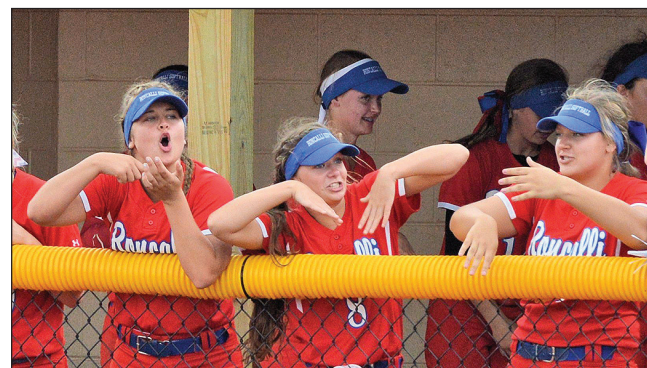
**Softball champions**

## Options available for health coverage

With our nation's health care seemingly always at the forefront of conversation and political wrangling these days, it's comforting to know there's one aspect of our system that has made vast improvements in the life of our children and youth.

The Children's Health Insurance Program is a one-of-a-kind initiative passed with wide bipartisan support and designed to provide insurance coverage to children whose families earn too much to qualify for medical assistance but who could not afford to purchase private insurance.

CHIP programs provide the standard Medicaid benefit package including vision, hearing and developmental screening, along with diagnostic and treatment services, which includes all medically necessary services like mental health and dental services.

Medicaid and CHIP have long served the nation's most vulnerable populations of low-income children and their parents, individuals with disabilities and low income seniors.

The Affordable Care Act established new coverage pathways, most notably for low-income adults, allowing Medicaid to serve as the solid foundation of coverage for low-income Americans. This coverage

expansion, along with eligibility and enrollment simplifications, is contributing to historic declines in the rate of the uninsured in America. As of the first half of 2016, the uninsured rate for all Americans is down to 8.9 percent, the lowest it has ever been.

Furthermore, the insured rate for children is at a historic high of 95 percent, and the uninsured rate has been cut nearly in half since 2008, translating into more than 3 million children gaining coverage as the CHIP Reauthorization Act of 2009 and the Affordable Care Act took effect. All groups of children experienced coverage gains in the last decade, and this is a success story for our country.

Medicaid provides health insurance for 564,000 low-income children in Indiana, with children making up 59.1 percent of Indiana's Medicaid population. In 2014, 153,523 Indiana children were covered by Hoosier Healthwise, our CHIP program. Each Medicaid-eligible child costs Indiana just \$2,270 per year, on average, compared to average costs per adult Medicaid enrollee of \$5,361.
