Grateful for his role as principal

Students at St. Jude Grade School know that they have a special principal in Joe Shelburn, so they probably won't be surprised if he wins the National Catholic Educational Association's Principal of the Year Award, which will be presented in April.

"It's pretty awesome to be nominated by the Office of Catholic Schools; it's truly an honor," said Shelburn, who is representing the Archdiocese of Indianapolis.

He has served as St. Jude's principal for eight years and previously taught at Perry Township's Alternative School and taught and coached at Brown County and Mooresville high schools.

While Shelburn said all schools offer fine learning opportunities, he prefers a Catholic education because it's connected to a parish that offers a school. "It offers a strong sense of community; we have families that have been in our parish 50 or 60 years. We have a shared vision of growing our faith and what we want out of ourselves. Having like-minded priorities is powerful. Catholic schools have a strong tradition.

Catholic education key to his success

Whenever Denny Sponsel finds himself staring down the eye of a difficult business situation, he usually falls back on his Catholic education for guidance.

"The influence that my priests, nuns and teachers placed on values was profound to me," said Sponsel, who purchased RJE Business Interiors in 2000. "I lean back on everything they taught me. Those lessons were the backbone of my upbringing."

Sponsel attended St. Philip Neri, Latin School – an all-boys high school - and St. Joseph's College.

And learning was not limited to the classrooms. "I look back on my coaches, and they taught toughness and discipline while instilling me with wisdom. They left a mark on me. I later realized that they had prepared me to deal with any challenges that might come up later in life. We learned a lot beyond reading, writing and arithmetic.

"I remember my eighth-grade basketball team being down by five baskets at halftime. Our heads were hung low in the locker room, and our coach explained the situation like this: 'If we go out and get the tip to start the second half and score, we are only down by four baskets. If we stop them on their first possession and go down and score, we are only down three baskets ...

That little speech motivated Sponsel and his team so much that they went out and won by 10 points.

The lesson he learned: When faced with a difficult challenge, break it down into its simplest form. That way it's much easier to

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
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Why I love Nativity Grade School

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
Do you go to a Catholic school? I

Treating the flu

During this more difficult than usual cold and flu season, many of us have felt ill and asked ourselves these familiar questions: Should I go to the drugstore to buy an over-the-counter remedy. go to my doctor or an urgent care center to get an anti-flu medication, or would I be better served staying home drinking fluids, resting and taking medicine for fever and pain?

It is important to understand viruses like the flu to help you decide how to deal with a potentially serious situation.

You can ease the misery at home by drinking lots of fluids,

ingesting some hot soup or herb

tea with honey and getting plenty of rest. You'll also want to humidify the air. Try a warm compress over your forehead and nose to relieve headache or sinus pain, and battle a sore throat with cough drops, throat lozenges and honey, which can also be effective at easing a troubling cough.

To open clogged airways, bring a pot of water to a boil and remove it from the heat. Drape a towel over your head, close your eyes, and lean over the water under the "tent," breathing deeply through your nose for 30 seconds.

If you live alone and have a family member or friend who has offered to check in on you and make sure you have everything you need, welcome their generosity with open arms. Their kindness and personal touch will be a tremendous comfort to you.

If you are having problems breathing, extreme discomfort, holding down or taking in liquids or noticing a decrease in your urine output, you should seek care immediately. A health-care provider may prescribe Tamiflu to help decrease the symptoms of influenza if it is within 48 hours of developing the infection.

If your symptoms are severe enough that you decide to go to your doctor, an urgent care clinic or the emergency room, it's a good idea to bring a list of all the medications you take, including over-the-counter medicine, vitamins and supplements. This list should include how much of each medication you take as well as how often you take it, in addition to a list of allergies.
