HALL OF FAMER BILL SPRINGER Fans honor former basketball coach

Southport High School legendary basketball coach Bill Springer – after more than three hours of socializing with former players – had the opportunity to speak to the thousands of fans assembled Nov. 20 inside Southport Fieldhouse.

Standing with former players and the families of three other Southport coaches in the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame, Springer said, "We are only here tonight because of you (players). ... Always remember, nothing is more important in your life than faith and family."

That was one of the life lessons that Springer's players learned.

On Bill Springer Night, Springer, who won 178 of his 539 career wins with the Cards, was honored with former coaches Jewell Young, 17 years, represented by son Rich Young; Carl "Blackie" Braden, 250 wins, represented by son Mark Braden; and Marilyn Ramsey, coach of the 1980 state championship lady Cardinals, represented by team standout Amy Metheny.

Banners honoring those coaches were displayed for the first time Nov. 20.

Springer added a Southport Pride Award to his induction into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2001 and the school's Wall of Fame in 2012.

The Cardinals won eight sectionals, one regional and one semistate under Springer. In 1990 the Cardinals upset Lawrence North and Eric Montross for the regional title. In front of 41,046 at the Hoosier Dome, the Cardinals fell to Mr. Basketball Damon Bailey and Bedford North Lawrence in the state finals. Indiana Sports Network broadcaster and Southport alumnus Steve McClure called Southport's tourney run a "magic carpet ride."

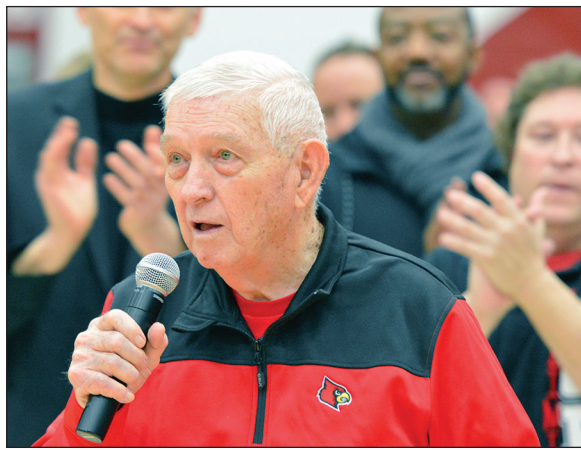
After the on-court ceremonies, Springer told *The Southsider Voice*, "This has been a tremendous night with all the fellows coming back from all parts of the country. I don't know what effect I've had on them; but I do know what effect they've had on me."

On this festive night the Cardinals' pep band played during the boys and girls games between Southport and Perry Meridian; a "miracle minute" raised funds for Best Buddies; and a teddy bear toss at halftime of the boys game resulted in 123 bears for use by police and fire departments and women's shelters.

In a unique battle of a Perry Township doubleheader, Perry won the girls game 59-44 before Southport captured a thrilling boys game on a buzzer-beater, 45-43.

Springer was the honoree at a pregame reception with scores of former players available to be interviewed. Here's what they had to say:

Deciding on the right health insurance plan

Ordinarily we focus on specific injuries or illnesses in this column, but one of the most vital and controversial aspects of health care these days is health insurance, and it's important to know how to choose the plan that's right for you and your family. Most Americans receive health insurance plans through their em-

ployers. For everyone else not old enough to qualify for Medicare, the best advice to find the lowest premiums is to shop Indiana's Affordable Care Act Marketplace or the Federal Marketplace. Start by going to www.HealthCare.gov and entering your ZIP code. The open enrollment period for 2019 runs through Dec. 15. Outside of this period, enrolling in a plan can only be done if you have a particular life event such as marriage, a birth of a child or change in health insurance coverage.

Once entering the website or a state exchange, you'll find four different levels - bronze, silver, gold and platinum. The less valuable the metal, the more you will pay for deductibles and other items. The more valuable metal levels have more comprehensive coverage but higher premiums.

It's always important to look at a summary of benefits while comparing plans. Online marketplaces usually provide a link to the summary and show the cost near the plan's title. A provider directory, which lists the doctors and clinics that participate in the plan's network, should also be available. If you're acquiring your health insurance through an employer, be sure to ask a benefits summary.

There are many options when it comes to health coverage, and it can be confusing. Eskenazi Health has a dedicated staff of navigators to assist you with health insurance enrollment, and a toll-free phone number - 1-855-202-1053 - is available to connect with staff who can answer questions and provide assistance in using the online marketplace. Covering Kids and Families (www.ckfindiana.org) also has navigators to help make this important decision.

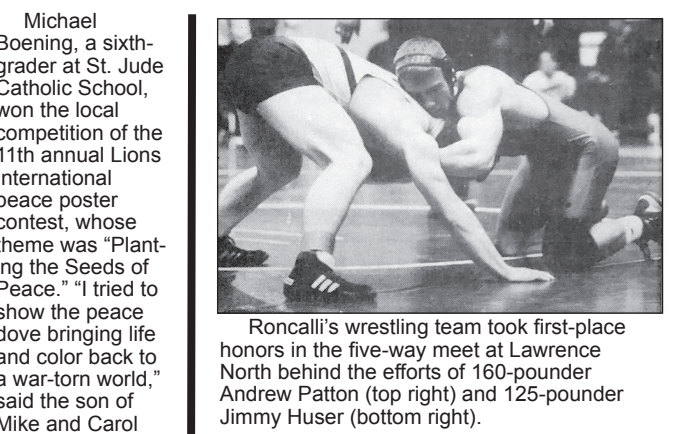

Greenwood and the Indiana State Police have agreed for Indy South Greenwood Airport to host the police's aviation section fleet for a period of time.

The airport provides convenient and comfortable amenities for residents, visitors and business leaders across central Indiana, Mayor Mark W. Myers said. "We are proud to welcome the Indiana State Police aviation section to Greenwood and look forward to serving as the home base for such a critical component of law enforcement services in Indiana."

State police Superintendent Doug Carter said they decided on the airport due to its proximity to I-65 and centralized location providing convenient access to other parts of the state. "We are looking forward to our new aviation home and believe this is the beginning of a strong and enduring partnership with Greenwood and the airport."

The city's Redevelopment Commission has approved funding for a new hangar to house the fleet as part of the pact. Construction is expected to begin once lease negotiations are finalized.

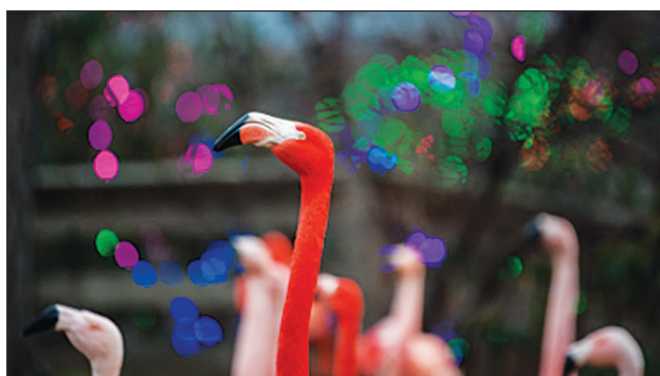

Personal Recollections

By Fred Shonk

A museum to honor former Indiana State University and Boston Celtics star Larry Bird is under construction in Terre Haute. I met Bird a few times when driving him and the Celtics from the Indianapolis airport to downtown. I'd also taken them to practice and later the game before returning them to the airport.

During the 1991-92 NBA season, almost everyone was sure that it was going to be Bird's last year as a player. I was thinking about this quite a bit as I drove out to pick up the team for its last scheduled game against the Pacers that season.

The team arrived on time and we quickly loaded all the gear as the players and coaches settled in their seats. Just as we were starting to enter a ramp to the interstate, I noticed a television cameraman that seemed to be taping us as we drove past. We soon passed a couple of other TV crews. My thought was that the news stations were interested in covering Bird's last game at Market Square Area. After passing the television crews, the drive downtown was uneventful until arriving at the Westin hotel, where a couple of men in suits approached the bus and asked to talk with the coaches.

After some discussion one of the assistant coaches returned to the bus and directed all of the players and remaining staff to exit except for one player.

I later found out that the detained player had been involved in a hit-and-run accident the previous evening in Boston.

Things became much clearer to me then. The cameramen weren't positioned along the interstate because of Bird's last game in Indianapolis. They were interested in the breaking story coming out of Boston. They had followed us downtown and were setting up cameras near the bus. Soon, the detained player and the fellows talking with him exited the bus and went inside the hotel. That was the last I heard about the incident for a few years.

One of the Celtics during that time was Robert "The Chief" Parish. We hit it off and enjoyed chatting each time the team was in town. A few years later he started for the Chicago Bulls, joining Michael Jordan, Scotty Pippen and Dennis Rodman.

On one occasion when talking with The Chief, I asked him if he had any recollection of when one of his teammates had been involved in that hit-and-run in Boston. He told me that the player had been convicted and served time before moving to Europe to play basketball.

Parish said the player was a good guy who made a couple of bad choices. He also told me that the guy had learned from his mistakes and was in the process of piecing his life back together. I don't remember that player's name, but I'll never forget the passion and concern in The Chief's voice as he gave me the update.

Bird finished the year and became a member of the 1992 men's Olympic basketball team, which is still known as The Dream Team. He later coached the Pacers before being named team president. He still does consulting work for the squad and is the only person in the NBA to be honored as Most Valuable Player, Coach of the Year and Executive of the Year.

I'm looking forward to the opening of the museum. Shonk is a 1960 graduate of Southport High School, a '63 grad of Indiana Central College (now the University of Indianapolis) and a retired bus driver from Beech Grove Schools.

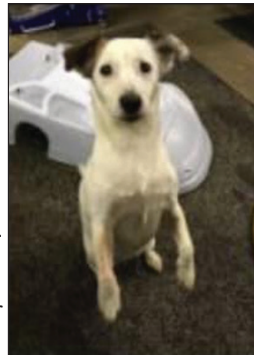

The Southport Cardinals put an exclamation mark on Bill Springer Night by adding more history to Southport Fieldhouse.

In front of scores of former Southport players, the Cardinals won the boys basketball version of the Battle of Perry Township 45-43 on a buzzer-beater by senior Brian Wilson. The winning shot from just inside the 3-point line came an instant after teammate Brevin Jefferson's driving shot was blocked in the lane by Chris McDonald.

"The ball bounced down in front of me," Wilson recalled. "I picked it up; I called it (in) when I shot it."

Wilson's shot touched off a celebration with his teammates in front of the scorer's table and concluded a night to remember in the historic fieldhouse.

Spurred by a pair of 3-pointers by Jayaun Moore, the Cardinals built a 27-15 halftime lead. Perry Meridian, coached for the first time by veteran Mark James, opened the third quarter with a 2-3 zone defense that forced turnovers and led to a 9-0 run. Senior Semaj Danley led the comeback with five points.

"It (zone) was a great move by coach James," praised Southport coach Eric Brand. "We had prepared for it, but we didn't handle it well. We began to play tight on offense and that dictated our defense too. We were able to move the ball later in the half."

The Falcons never led but tied it at 40 and 43, the last time on Reggie McDonald's 3-point shot with 2:43 to go. They committed a half-court violation that gave the ball Southport for the eventual winning shot.

Jefferson led Southport with 16 points and eight rebounds and 6-7 Chaz Hinds added 12 points. The Cards hit 17-of-32 field goal tries. Sophomore Jayden Taylor paced the Falcons with 15 points, including six in the fourth quarter. Danley wound up with 10 points. PM connected on 16-of-38 shots.

"Both teams played hard," James said. "It stinks that we got beat. It came down to a one-possession game. I'm pleased with our kids because they fought."

The doubleheader got underway with Perry Meridian's girls

putting together a 22-point attack in the second quarter for a 59-44 win. The Falcons biggest lead was 44-22.

PM's 6-4 senior Caitie Baird had a game-high 17 points; teammate Ariana Booker scored 12. Juniors Kyra Duncan, 13 points, and Lexie Green 11, led Southport.

Southport's boys are 2-0 after dominating Seymour 56-42 Saturday. The Cards enjoyed a 34-12 halftime lead and were led by Jefferson and Hinds, who combined for 35 points.

Hornets sting twice

Beech Grove's boys team won its home debut on Matt English Court against conference foe Seccina 73-47 Saturday after running away for a 101-80 win at host Greenfield Nov. 20.

With coach Matt English court-side, the Hornets turned a slim 24-16 halftime lead into a 26-point win against the Crusaders. At Greenfield, five Hornets were in double figures: Jujan Allison with 24 points, Gavin Hess 17, John Parker 15, Josh Copenhagen 15, and Griffin Wade 12.

No. 3 Center Grove also is 2-0 after defeating Franklin 68-48 and Franklin Central 81-55. Mr. Basketball candidate Trayce Jackson-Davis scored 53 points and pulled down 20 rebounds for the Trojans in the two games. Teammate Spencer Piercefield canned six 3s in scoring 20 points against the Flashes.

Three Southside teams face ranked foes with No. 4 Cathedral visiting CG Friday and No. 1 Warren Central calling on Franklin Central and No. 6 Ben Davis testing Southport Saturday.
