Young giraffe newest addition to Indy zoo

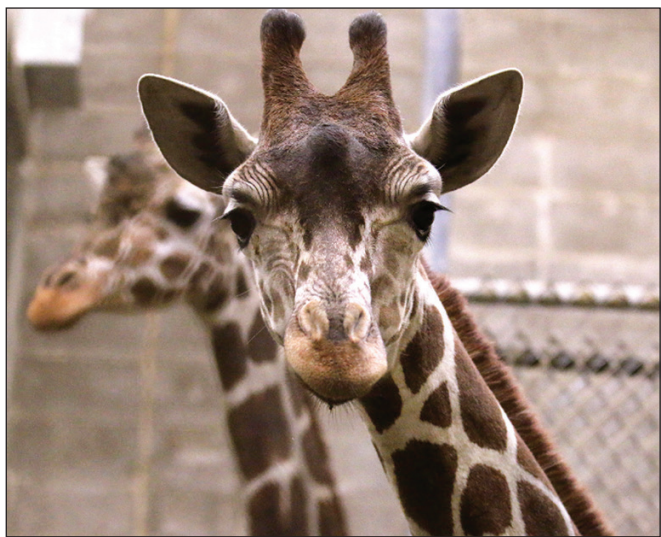

The newest addition to the Indianapolis Zoo will certainly make a sizeable impression when guests meet her in the spring.

Kita, a 1-year-old female reticulated giraffe, arrived in mid-October. Following a standard 30-day quarantine, she is becoming acquainted with the zoo's other three giraffes.

While Kita was born at the Fort Wayne Children's Zoo on Aug. 6, 2017, she has past connections to the Circle City. Her father, Ezeji, was born at the Indianapolis Zoo in 2009, one of the many offspring of the zoo's breeding pair Eddie and Elena.

Though Kita already stands more than 10 feet tall, she is noticeably smaller and lighter in color than the zoo's other giraffes. Females can grow to around 15 feet tall; males can reach 18 feet or more.

Zookeepers say she is curious with a relaxed personality. She warmed up to keepers right away and has been hand-feeding from them while she and the other giraffes are spending the winter in a temperature-controlled facility.

Giraffes, the tallest animals on land, are one of Africa's most iconic species, and they are vulnerable to extinction, reports the zoo.

Healthy new year's resolutions

As the New Year's Eve holiday rolls around each year, it's natural for everyone to take stock of their lives and determine where there's room for improvement. After a period of reflection, many of us come up with our resolutions for the new year with the sincere belief that this time through great dedication and sheer will, all of us will reach our goals.

With that belief in mind, let's explore some of the more popular resolutions - that when we stick with them - will make our lives decidedly healthier.

One of the most popular and hardest resolutions to keep is the declaration to quit smoking. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, an estimated 36.5 million American adults smoked as of 2015. The CDC states that among Americans who smoke, 68 percent say they want to quit for good.

As most smokers will tell you, giving up cigarettes is exceedingly difficult. Nicotine is addictive and causes your body to go through withdrawal when it doesn't receive a constant supply. In addition to the immediate cravings and withdrawal symptoms, people who quit smoking may continue to struggle with breaking the habit long after those initial challenges subside.

Some smokers have the strength to quit cold turkey, while many know they need help to get the job done. Smoking remains the leading cause of preventable death and disease in the United States, killing more than 480,000 Americans each year, so if you smoke please quit now. Additional resolutions that will help you lead a healthy life include making annual primary care appointments for yourself and your children. It's also a good idea to keep an up-to-date file about your family's health.

Get at least eight hours of sleep each night, eat three meals a day and don't skip breakfast. Wear sunscreen during daylight hours and find an outlet for your stress, which could mean just talking about your frustrations with a trusted friend. Also get plenty of exercise, drink enough water and if you drink alcohol, consider cutting back on your consumption.

Personal Recollections By Fred Shonk

It's always lots of fun to look back on special Christmases with friends and family. Until I was in the seventh grade my father operated a pickup milk route. He collected milk every day - Christmas too - from dairy farmers and delivered it to the dairy processing plant.

I remember riding with him a couple of times on Christmas Day. Almost every farm family came out of their houses to greet us, and most had something special to give to my dad. Sometimes there was a present with my name on it.

Dad's route started early each morning. Santa had knowledge of his route and always had our house on the early list so that my presents from him were under the tree before the alarm clock sounded. We would scamper into the living room and check out the presents from Santa. We opened the wrapped gifts after Dad returned from his route.

My sister, Kathy, is about 5 years younger than me. That worked out well for me as Santa continued delivering gifts to me a few years longer than some of my buddies who didn't have younger siblings. It seems that Santa and my folks were pretty good friends. A couple of times I discovered boxes in our basement prior to Santa's visit. A few days after Christmas I sometimes saw those boxes again except then they were empty. I even spotted a bicycle down in the basement a couple of times.

Christmas parties were always a big part of the last few days of school before the Christmas/new year break. I attended Edgewood Grade School and Christmas was always festive at our school.

We lived on Madison Avenue when Dad sold his milk route and opened a Sunoco service station in the Edgewood area. Our station was open from 6 a.m.-10 p.m. daily except for Christmas.

Our next big family thing was moving from our home on Madison Avenue to a couple of blocks north of Banta Road. We enjoyed decorating the new house for Christmas and connecting with new neighbors.

A few years later I accepted a new job and relocated to Southern California. I had an apartment near Disneyland. The first year that I lived out west I needed to return to Indianapolis to get discharged from the Indiana National Guard. It worked out that I could get that completed and be home to celebrate Thanksgiving all in the same trip. That was really great, but it meant that I would not be able to return for Christmas. It was too expensive and I didn't have any vacation days either.

That was my only year of not enjoying Christmas with any of my family. Each time I hear "I'll be home for Christmas," I remember that year, especially that part that says, "If only in my dreams." My California friends kept me busy and entertained that year.

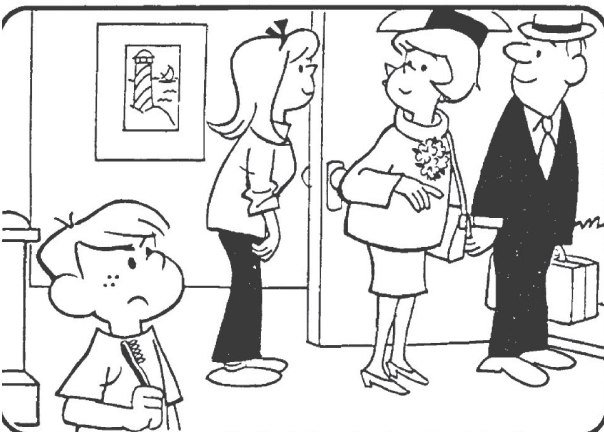

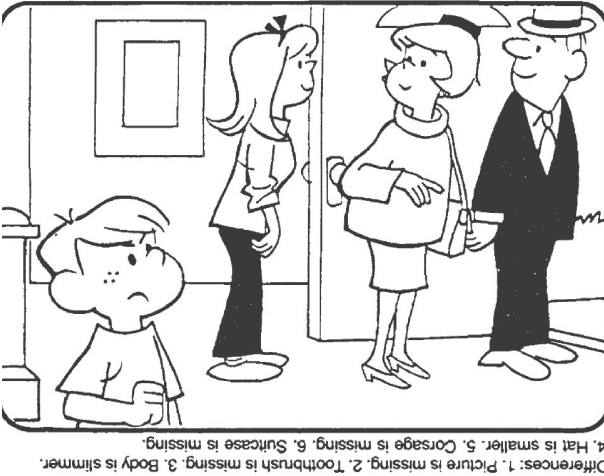

Public safety stakeholders developing plan to address gun violence

The Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department has joined other public safety stakeholders to develop a three-year plan aimed at addressing gun violence.

U.S. Department of Justice representatives spent two days in Indianapolis last week as officials from IMPD, the U.S. attorney's office, the Marion County prosecutor's office and Marion County Community Corrections met to begin the planning process.

"Pairing national best practices with locally tailored strategies is a proven model for enhancing public safety efforts," Mayor Joe Hogsett said.

"We developed the framework of a strategic plan to address gun violence in Indy," said Nola M. Joyce of the DOJ's Public Safety Partnership. "The next steps are to refine the plan and then the hard work of implementation by all of the stakeholders will begin."

IMPD East District Cmdr. Roger Spurgeon, who participated in the planning session, said he's excited about the prospect of strengthening an already-strong relationships with involved community groups, area law enforcement agencies and nongovernmental organizations to work together in an even more focused way to reduce gun violence.

"IMPD continues to deploy every tool in our toolbox to make Indianapolis safer," said Chief Bryan Roach. "The development of this plan will help establish a lasting coordination structure between public safety agencies and the community. We continue to be intelligence-led and target-specific in our efforts to rid communities of violence and enhance residents' hope and trust in our collective public safety efforts."

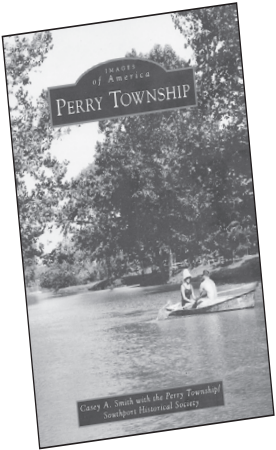

Library drops late fees

Greenwood Library has announced a major change to its circulation policy: the removal of late fees. Borrowers will still be responsible for replacement costs for lost items, but late fees will no longer be collected.

One of the strategic initiatives outlined in the library's soon-to-be-released Blueprint 2019/2023 is to "make library easy." For many people the threat of late fees deters them from library use. Others find

themselves with unexpectedly large fines and lose library privileges as a result. And although libraries have traditionally believed that late fees encourage the return of materials, research shows that late fees actually do more to discourage library use than they do to bring library materials back.

The library joins a growing number of libraries across the country that are making the

move to remove late fees. Patrons who are Evergreen card holders and go to other libraries to checkout materials, those items will be subject to the circulation policy in effect at that branch.

The financial impact of the decision is estimated to be approximately one-half of 1 percent of the library's operating budget. Through careful stewardship, GPL is financially sound and healthy, said director Cheryl Dobbs.

Woodmen dictate tempo against Hornets

Greenwood's boys basketball team honored Beech Grove coach Matt English by warming up in "Standing Tall Together" T-shirts Dec. 18 in the Hornets' first game against the Woodmen since his death and funeral.

Second-year Greenwood coach Joe Bradburn revealed that the Woodmen had planned on wearing the shirts during English's battle against brain cancer but that his death gave added significance to playing the Hornets. Bradburn signed the back of the coach's chair, which held English's signature hard hat and lunch pail.

Before the game Beech Grove coach Mike Renfro said, "This is therapy for us."

The Hornets, true to form, were aggressive on defense but could not speed up their offense in the second half as Greenwood snapped a four-game losing streak, 56-50.

"We went to a different tempo," Bradburn said. "We tried to slow them down and that worked in our favor. Defensively we set the tone. On the offensive end we did a better job of not turning the ball over against their multiple defenses."

Beech Grove jumped to a 21-13 advantage with 6-3 junior Jujan

Allison scoring 10 of his game-high 18 points. Greenwood then went on a 9-0 run before Allison regained a 23-22 lead for the Hornets just before the half.

The game was tied three times in the third quarter. The Woodmen pulled away for a 48-39 lead on two of senior J.R. Price's seven points in the fourth quarter. Allison scored from underneath and cut Greenwood's lead to 52-50 with 35 seconds left. A short-range shot by Gavin Dowling and two free throws by Bryce Hoffman iced the game for the Woodmen.

Bradburn credited Hoffman (16 points) with creating chaos defensively, Price also for grabbing key rebounds, freshman guard Brock Kincaid for controlling the ball on offense, Dowling (nine points) for his play near the basket, senior Devon Lester for his steady play and Ian Raker for hitting two timely 3s. Coming off the bench, 6-3 sophomore Rasheed Elemikan scored six points.

"We did a good job of breaking their press," Bradburn said. "We had the right combinations out there, but we have a lot to fine tune."

Greenwood (2-5) is in action Thursday at No. 10 Center Grove (6-2), and Beech Grove is in a four-team tourney Friday at Decatur Central.

Holiday tournaments: One-day tourneys Friday find Greenwood Christian at Seccina and Perry Meridian at Lebanon; on Saturday Center Grove is at Westfield and Franklin Central is at Martinsville. In girls action, Perry Meridian makes it annual trek Thursday to Warsaw; Friday finds Southport at New Palestine and Roncalli at Plainfield.
