Beech Grove buzzes for state finals-bound Hornets

'WeB4Me' believers defeat Sullivan in OT to reach 3A championship game Saturday

Beech Grove High School has been down this path 19 years ago.

That's when the girls basketball team brought home the program's first 3A IHSAA state championship in 2003. Led by eventual Miss Basketball Katie Gearlds, the Hornets brought the community together in support of the team. The Hornets didn't let their students or the community down as the Hornets dominated South Bend St. Joseph's. City signs at entry points to Beech Grove proclaim the 2003 championship.

A few years later, the Beech Grove community banded together for a far different reason. Beloved and courageous boys basketball coach Matt English passed away in December 2018 after battling brain cancer for several years. The outpouring of the community's respect was evident at a public "celebration of life" with his family and friends. The line virtually snaked through the school hallways. And the tribute was complete with English's two trademarks: a hard hat and lunch pail and the inscription "we before me" on the basketball court that was named in his honor a couple of months earlier.

And now, the mantra "WeB4Me" rolls on. Beech Grove's own Mike Renfro and his hearty band of Hornets are making sure that the foundation set by English reaches new heights.

Saturday afternoon inside historic Hatched House in Washington, the Hornets defeated Sullivan in overtime to earn the program's first-ever trip to the state finals. When the Hornets downed old nemesis Danville a week earlier for their very first regional title at Greencastle, Renfro teared up. This time, he stepped over to hug his dad in the grandstands and held the 3A championship trophy high above for all Hornets fans to see.

The surging unranked Hornets (21-6) take a 10-game winning streak into Gainbridge Fieldhouse for the 3A IHSAA championship game Saturday at 6 p.m. against No. 8 Mishawaka Marian (24-3).

"Like I tell our kids, you have to dream big," Renfro said on the court in an interview with media members. "For anybody who I've coached who has worn the orange and black uniform, this is for those guys. This is for Beech Grove."

Likewise, the community is for Beech Grove. It was evident before the semistate matchup with signs around town, particularly at Burger King at Hornet Drive (the main access to the campus), O'Gara's Irish Pub and City Hall on Main Street.

"The community on its own has gotten behind our team," Renfro praised. "You go around Beech Grove now and you'll see signs of support. Their ears are perked up. There's a buzz going round."

Inside the Hatched House Saturday, purple-clad Sullivan fans were predominate inside but the Hornets crowd made more noise. The "WeB4Me" throng was boisterous throughout as residents joined the student body with cheers and eventually the joy of a first-time semistate championship.

Basketball Blitz

Sweet 16 decided, 11 advertisers in running for prizes

There's a reason it's called March Madness. Who would have imagined that tiny No. 15 St. Peter's University would have defeated fabled No. 2 Kentucky (although it was on St. Patrick's Day) and later handcuffed a dangerous No. 7 Murray State to reach the Sweet 16.

U.K. was one of several high seeds that fell by the wayside in the NCAA tourney's first round, including defending national champion No. 1 Baylor, No. 2 Auburn, No. 6 LSU, and No. 3 Wisconsin.

For those interested in the latest Cinderella, St. Peter's is only the third No. 15 seed to reach the Sweet 16 after Oral Roberts last year and Florida Gulf Coast in 2013. The small university (enrollment under 3,000) are the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference champions. (MAAC). Their two tallest starters are 6-7, while Purdue can go with 7-4 Zach Edey and 6-10 Trevion Williams but not at the same time. Seeing super-slick Boiler guard Jaden Ivey go against the Peacocks backcourt will be interesting.

Purdue and Michigan State are the only two Big 10 teams left from nine entrants. The conference count going into the Sweet 16: Big 12, ACC, each three; Big 10, Pac 12, Big East, each two and West Coast, SEC, MAAC, AAC, each one.

I.U.'s late surge ended Thursday against well-rested St. Mary's in Portland, Oregon. The Hoosiers were plagued with flight problems and did not arrive in Portland until 7 a.m. after playing Tuesday night in Dayton. Coach Mike Woodson made no excuses, but the Hoosiers had no gas left in the tank. Likewise, Notre Dame played at Dayton but didn't play until late Friday afternoon.

Looking over the Sweet 16 regions, the West is the only one that follows the form chart with the top four seeds remaining.

Although most bracket sheets have been torn up, *Southsider Voice* advertisers have a high interest in the tourney as the Final Four receive advertising prizes.

Here's the advertisers still in the running: Shelby Upholstering & Interiors (North Carolina, Houston, Michigan, Iowa State, Miami) I.U. Credit Union (St. Peter's, Texas Tech.) Beck Service Center (Duke), Indy Rents (Gonzaga), Sleepy Hollow Pet Ranch (Kansas), Sun Publishing (Arkansas), Keenan Stahl Boys and Girls Club (UCLA), Lawrie CPA Group (Purdue), American Legion Post 355 (Arizona), B. And among the four "experts," Emma White, daughter of our community outreach representative Bob White, is slightly ahead of the foursome with eight teams left. IHSAA referee Ted Lobdell, *Southsider Voice* editor Al Stillely, and White have seven teams left in the field.

Sweet 16 games are Thursday and Friday with the Final Four decided Saturday and Sunday.

FALCON CAFÉ PROVIDES MEAL, STUDENT SKILLS

Perry Meridian High School may look like your typical school, but inside, there is something important cooking. Welcome to Falcon Café, where food is served and invaluable lessons are taught. Falcon Café was created specifically for special education students. David Conrad is a special education teacher at PMHS. Through the student-run café, he equips his students for real world experiences.

"It teaches them skills, so if they were to go out and work in a restaurant, they would already have the skills," said Conrad.

The café offers breakfast and lunch to PMHS staff. Meals cost around six dollars. On average, students prepare 25-30 meals a day. Each day, staff place orders. Students then cook or prepare meals with Mr. Conrad's support.

"They learn how to prepare and how to problem solve. Whenever they forget an item, what should they do? We can help support them and give them ideas on what they can do. So, they learn from that," said Conrad.

The lesson doesn't stop there. After meals are prepared, the food is packaged for students to deliver to staff.

"It helps them create and start socializing, starting a conversation with someone. So, it helps them in so many different ways," said Conrad.

There is something in it for Conrad as well, "It's nice to see them use those ideas later on without even having to prompt them. That is very rewarding."

Falcon Café started in 2010. Proceeds from the program go back into the program to cover the cost of food, educational purposes and students even get a pay check!

This team was invited to play in the WNIT Tournament. They won their first game last week and, by the time this edition of the newspaper is available on Wednesday, they will have competed in their second-round game. They will have played Marquette University in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. I know that all of Beech Grove and the entire Southside will be pulling for Katie and her team.

It has been so much fun to follow and cheer on local high school and college basketball teams. I enjoy remembering the good teams with special players. Southport teams that were a few years ahead of my class had some special players. My class had some really good players. I'm still friends with several of them.

Brothers Dale and Paul Hendricks, both Boy Scout leaders and veterans of World War II, opened an insurance agency at 2934 Madison Ave.

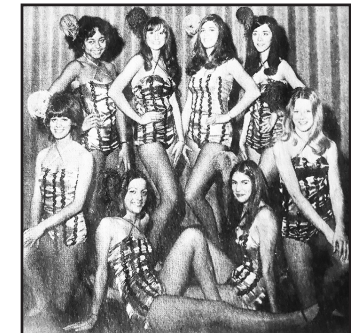

20 Years Ago This Week - 2002

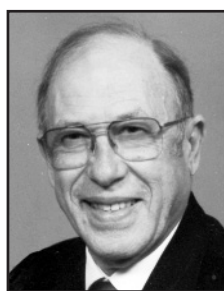

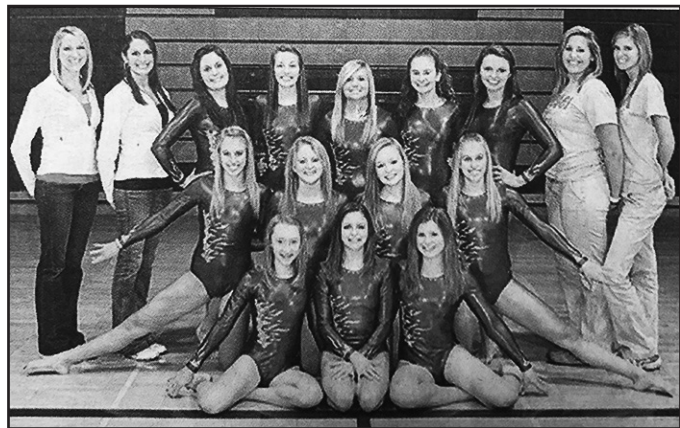

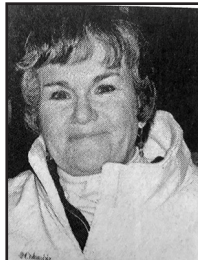

Hornets refuse to lose in 'dog fight' to earn first semistate trophy

There was no hiding the Beech Grove Hornets joy when the final buzzer went off.

Adding to their string of firsts, the Hornets collected their initial IHSAA semistate championship Saturday afternoon by edging Sullivan, 62-58 in a tense overtime game that BG coach Mike Renfro called "a dog fight."

Players jumped and hugged each other. They held the trophy high. Then one by one, they climbed the ladder to cut down a piece of the net inside the fabled Hatchet House in Washington.

They will face No. 2 Mishawaka Marian (24-3) for the IHSAA 3A state championship Saturday at 6 p.m. at Gainbridge Fieldhouse.

But back to the celebration.

"I love it; I love games like that," remarked 6-0 junior guard Jeremiah Tate whose main assignment was to guard Sullivan's leading scorer and Indiana All-Star candidate Randy Kelly, a 6-0 senior guard. "This feels really good to know that we did it."

Junior Rylan Horen, who hit a free throw to extend the lead to four points with four seconds left, exclaimed, "We're happy to win this thing; I can't wait to get there (Gainbridge)."

Junior Jaleel Alexander, who led the Hornets with 16 points, added, "We knew we could pull it out...it's amazing - we're going to state."

And finally, coach Renfro said, "It's a refuse-to-lose attitude, we before me, and that's what we will carry with us on Saturday (state finals)."

The Hornets (21-6) overcame many obstacles to win their 10th consecutive game.

Junior Anthony Ball, a force around the basket, got in foul trouble

early, picked up his fourth foul on the opening play of the third quarter, and fouled out in a rebound scum under Sullivan's basket with 4:39 left in regulation. Ball still wound up with a team-high eight rebounds.

The Hornets hit a horrid four of 14 free throws during a late fourth quarter and early overtime stretch. Fortunately, Alexander hit his first of two free throws for a 51-49 but Sullivan senior Rocco Rochel sent it to overtime with a layup to lead.

The Hornets missed back-to-back-to-back free throws but Tate slipped in front for a put-back and a 53-51 lead to start the OT with a lead that BG never gave up.

"I saw the ball come off the rim and I went for it," Tate recalled. "I knew I just had to get it."

Sullivan coach Jeff Moore went for the percentages in OT but the Hornets hit a perfect six of six free throws as Tate hit four and Alexander hit two for a 61-58 lead that left it up to Horen to hit one of two tosses for a clinching four-point lead and win.

The Hornets trailed 41-35 early in the fourth quarter but tied it at 41-all on Ball's two free throws, Edwards' short field goal, and Brown's two free throws within one and one-half minutes.

Beech Grove opened the game with a fullcourt press for a 22-14 first-quarter lead, but the Golden Arrows adjusted and led 39-35 at halftime. In the second half and overtime, the Hornets mixed a 3-2 zone occasionally that took away Sullivan's momentum.

Renfro played 10 Hornets with the bench contributing 10 points and a stout defense as Brown played most of the second half in place of Ball.

"Any guy we bring off the bench is going to contribute," coach Renfro said. "Cam (Brown) did a good job defensively and rebounding, and Rylan (Horen) sealed the deal with his free throw. The rest is history now."

The preparations began Monday for the Hornets most important game in the program's history.

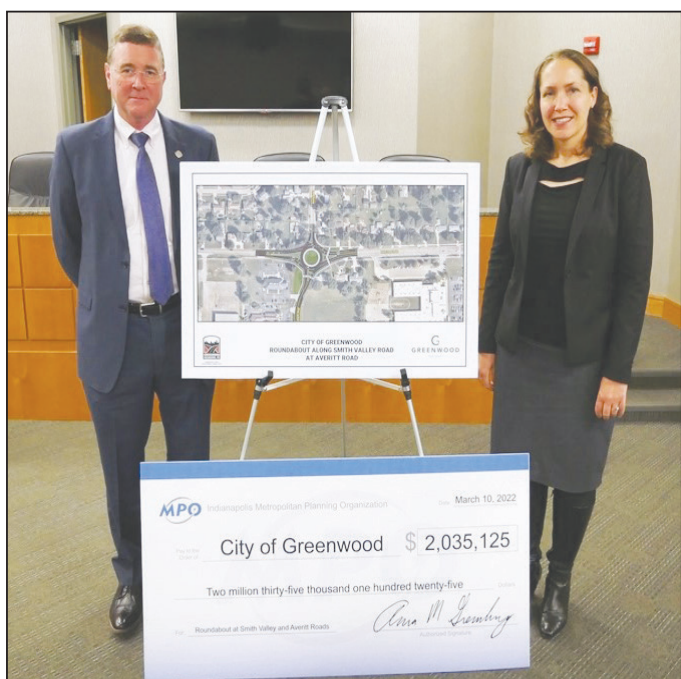
