Bears were crowned world champions in multiple events at the World Jump Rope Championships earlier this month in Orlando,



# Karate is much more than a martial art

Mario Hinojosa and France Tokach were not overly impressed when introduced to Shihan's Kandan Karate about three years ago. But oh how that has changed.

Mario, a junior at Perry Meridian, and France, an eighth-grader at Little Flower, have grown to love the martial art, and they earned their black belts July 14 at Garfield Park's Burrello Family Center, where classes are offered. They were tested on self-defense, techniques and their knowledge of Japanese terminology. And as black belts they are qualified to teach.

France, whose mother, Kary Dangler, died suddenly in December, has found karate to help her cope with the loss. She's at the center from 6-8 p.m. every Tuesday and Thursday and from 10 a.m.-noon Saturday for practice, as is Mario

"I like the people I practice with, and I even practice at home," said France, the school's youngest black belt ever. "It's not easy, and it requires a lot of discipline. I feel that I can protect myself, and I plan to continue with karate for a long time.

"I don't talk too much about karate, but I told my classmates that I was going for my black belt."

"Karate has been the best therapy possible for France," said Shannon Pool,

# Lt. Allan Memorial, new city building open house Friday

One of the most sig-nificant days in Southport's history unfolds Friday with the dedication of a memorial for Lt. Aaron Allan, who was killed in the line of duty last vear, and the official opening of the city's new Municipal Building.
On the first anniversary

of Allan's death, the memorial unveiling ceremony begins at 2 p.m. outside the new municipal building at 137 Worman St. with an open house from 3-6 p.m.

Allan, Southport's 2015 Officer of the Year, was fatally shot July 27, 2017, after responding to an accident on Madison Avenue. He served as a reserve officer with the department for six years before becoming the first full-time paid officer in January 2017.

He is survived by his wife, Stacy, and sons TJ and Aaron Jr.

Contributions are being accepted to help fund the department's training and equipment room; \$100 per



person, \$250 per business. Each contributor's name will be on the memorial

The building is the new home of the police department, offices for the mayor, clerk-treasurer, Board of Works chair, Parks Department director and a meeting room. The police department goes from 300 square feet to more than 7,500 square feet.

Chief Thomas Vaughn explained that

# Church music director building virtual organ

The sounds of pipe organs from England, Poland, the United States and virtually from around the world will fill the sanctuary at Greenwood United Methodist Church as Drew Worthen has taken his love of the pipe organ to a new level.

The church's fifth-year music director is close to finishing up an organ based on the Hauptwerk Virtual Pipe Organ platform, which utilizes the most modern digital technology to incorporate the sounds of the world's great pipe organs.

"The difficulty always has been in the attempt to play music from one period in time on a pipe organ that is not from that same period," Worthen said. "We are at a point in history that we can do that digitally now."

By recording each pipe of a specific pipe organ, Worthen explained, the exact sound of each pipe in stereo or surround sound is replicated with the virtual organ. Each sound is recorded then entered digitally into a computer and distributed to 50 speakers.

At Greenwood UMC, the organist eventually will use a console built in 1965 that Worthen bought two years ago from the former Olive Branch Christian Church.

He added a fourth keyboard and refinished the console. Three rectangle "windows" in the new front will house small LCD screens that will give a real-time read out of vari-



ous aspects of the organ. Three screens can display information on expression pedal positions, loaded registrations, static text, tunings, etc. It will have a "setter" board.

Worthen, who earned a master's degree in music theory and composition at Butler University, has put his building skills, music knowledge and audio/visual technology skills to work from his full-time employment at Sensory Technologies.

'Our goal is to bring some degree of comfort to cancer patients as they undergo treatment," said sales manager Andy Thimlar





"The sounds are loaded into a custom-built computer and fed into an organ like we are planning to have here; it can play that exact pipe sound," Worthen said. "So instead of building an expensive pipe organ, we can digitally combine all the different sounds and pipes with its uniqueness and some eccentricities into one instrument

It is the most realistic way imaginable to repeat the pipe organ sound in the digital world. It takes tens of thousands of sound strikes (original pipes) to be reassembled by the software in real time while playing the virtual organ."

He said it takes about five minutes for the computer to pull up a specific pipe organ. The organist then can select from an array of pipe organs, for example, from St. Bartholomeus Church in Austria; Salisbury Cathedral in England, and St. John Cantius Church in Poland. The organist can pull up French pipe organs or switch to popular theater ones like the vintage Paramount organ.

A \$25,000 fundraising drive for the virtual organ - the first of its kind in Indiana - continues Saturday with a dinner and a talent show beginning at 6 p.m. at the church, 525 N. 

Don Schenck, 62, a seventhdegree black belt and a 34-year teacher, accepts no compensation for his services. "I'm retired; I volunteer my time to keep our costs down. I want to bring more of the Southside community into our program. We have the space.

The students are up for ranking every three or four months if they have good attendance and a proper attitude.

"I only require my students to work hard and give it their best effort," said Schenck, adding that it's his goal to develop his young students into outstanding community members. Besides the physical fitness aspect of the program, he sees improvements in his students' self-confidence and personal discipline. "It's all about improving our minds, bodies and spirits."

Nowhere is that more clear than with Mario, who says, "I was overweight and had a lot of pimples when I started karate. I didn't like my appearance. I have lost a lost of weight, and my pimples are gone. I have gained self-confidence, and I am a lot healthier. I owe it

Mario, son of Maribel and Mario Hinojosa, often practices in his backyard. "I'm pretty confident that I can protect myself. I work hard," he said, noting that his younger brother, Ivan, introduced him to karate.

Schenck had high praise for Mario and France after they received their black belts, and he nearly teared up when presenting them special gifts for their dedication to karate.

They are ordinary students who work extraordinarily hard to get to where they are. They put perfect effort into everything they do. And if they aren't doing something right, that just challenges them to improve themselves. Mario is always there to help me with classes. If some of the students feel a little uncomfortable about approaching

Karate has become a way of life for Schenck, and he doesn't see that changing. "It's all about training for a lifetime. It's my goal to be teaching past 80. If I quit teaching, it means I'm in a casket.'




