Today's band members were among thousands of teens who thronged to the club in the '60s and '70s. Teens from central Indiana then danced to vocals by Joe Walsh who later joined The Eagles and lead singer Michael McDonald then of "The Guild." The band still performs Reo Speedwagon's "Back on the Road Again."

Popular national bands that performed at the Sherwood Club included Black Sabbath, The Buckinghams, The New Colony Six, Question Mark & the Mysterians, and Mason Profitt.

Brown, Iverson, and Townsend played mostly corporate and private events as members of Edsal Moon throughout the 1980s.

"We're all friends and that makes it really fun to perform together," Brown said. "It's nearly impossible to put a group together that really likes each other and enjoys performing together. We're playing songs from a genre that we really enjoy and we really get along with each other."

Each band member has performed on stage for years. They fondly remember being at the club where the Boys Next Door, Oliver's, The Dawn Five, The Guild, and Carl Story with the Pure Gold Band would perform.

Brown is a 1970 graduate of Lawrence Central High School. He has performed with Story, Henry Lee Summer, and once with Bobby Vee. He performed with Big Daddy Caddy a few weeks ago at The Slippery Noodle.

# **A Celebration for the Ages**



On Aug. 7, the Franklin Township Historical Society (FTHS) celebrated the 150th anniversary of the Meeting House, formerly the Big Run Baptist Church building, at 6510 S. Franklin Road. Two years after the church dissolved, it became the historical society's home in 1977 where it has been preserved with many Franklin Township artifacts. The Sesquicentennial Celebration attracted scores of residents and history buffs. Organist Jim Kemp, (left photo), plays the antique pump organ that was used in the church decades ago. Arvine Tolle, (right photo), awaits his turn to tell patrons of his days of preaching in the Big Run church as a traveling pastor. William Maze talked about his ancestors who are buried in the Big Run Cemetery and Diane Hawk took visitors on a tour of the cemetery. Alena VanArendonk talked about the interurban of the early 1900s that brought parishioners to the Big Run church. ## **STUART AND THE RED FOX**

A couple of weeks ago, my wife, Lyn, made a trip to Tractor Supply and Rural King in Greenwood for some supplies for our chickens. Each business stocks the necessities we need for our chicken girls. However, I had something different on my calendar for that day, so I missed that trip with Lvn.

Later, when I arrived home, I met five new baby chickens that Lyn picked out and brought home. They are of different breeds but very cute. They need to stay warm, so Lyn fixed them an area in our garage equipped with a heat lamp. It's fun to watch them each day as they quickly grow.

One of our older chicken girls has not been feeling very well. Lyn made an appointment and we drove her to the chicken doctor's office in Franklin. She was diagnosed as having a parasite and was given some medicine. Her name is Michelle (named after our daughter) and she is also residing in our garage for a few more days. She seems to be feeling better each day.

We now have 11 chicken girls living with us. The six older ones have special names. Three are named after family members and three are named after close neighbors. We have not decided on names for our five young girls as yet. I will keep everyone posted when the names are all in place.

It is so cool when Lyn allows our older chickens out of their enclosed outside area to spend some time in the backyard. Our dog, Stuart, and cat, Harry, might also be outside at the same time. They all get along wonderfully and seldom pay much attention to each other. The property north of us is one of the pastures belonging to the

Southport Equestrian Center. A small creek runs through their property and then just east of us. Over the years we have seen lots of wild animals that enjoy the creek, the wooded areas and the horse farm pastures.

For a few years, we were blessed with a great-horned owl family. We have seen many deer roaming through the property. This summer I had spotted a red fox a few times, mostly early in the morning. The red fox scampers through our backyard and doesn't look at the chicken house or their fenced-in outdoor yard.

For many years, Stuart has understood that sometimes some of those wild animals might still be roaming around in our backyard when it's time for his first outdoor visit before breakfast. When he steps outside and detects the odor of any of those wild creatures that were or still might be in our yard, he begins barking. Stuart seldom barks any other time. I'm fairly certain that he is communicating to all the wild creatures in or near our yard.

If I could translate, it would probably be something like this: "My name is Stuart. This is my yard ... please go home." Last week, our grandson and his new bride stopped in for a visit. He

and I were sitting on the back patio talking. It was getting dark. Stuart was hanging out with us. All of a sudden, grandson, Trey pointed and asked. "Is that a fox?"

Stuart will be 17 years old next month. He is normally a very slowmoving fellow. He and I move at about the same pace most of the time. Stuart also spotted the fox. He leaped off the patio and flew across our backyard. He was barking loudly. I'm thinking that the translation of that barking wouldn't get past our editor. You can use your imagination. The

fox quickly disappeared across the creek. Later, Stuart walked Lyn out and showed her the exact path the little fox had taken.

Today, as I was putting this week's article together, Stuart and Harry were with me in the little outside building that is known as my "hideout" They both were deeply involved in naps. I woke them up and read this column to them.

Their tails wagged and both returned to their naps. It's good to have their approval.



#### 30 Years Ago This Week - 1991







# **Motorsports and Sports** Indiana's Newman stares at **NASCAR crossroads again**

Indiana's own Ryan Newman has been on this road before. Once known as "The Rocket" for his qualifying prowess, Newman's choices for 2022 are to find a full-time ride with another NASCAR Cup team or stay with Roush Fenway Racing on a part-time basis.

Newman's future with Jack Roush, his fourth famous team owner, went up in the air when Brad Keselowski was announced as a driverowner for 2022 and move into the No. 6 Ford now manned by the South Bend veteran driver. Roush Fenway intends to field only two full-time rides next year and keep Chris Buescher in the No. 17 Ford as a teammate with Keselowski.

Newman joined the Roush team in 2019 having raced for famed team owners Roger Penske, Richard Childress, and winning the 2013 Brickyard 400 as a "lame duck" with co-owners Tony Stewart and Gene Haas. Kevin Harvick already had been named to replace Newman before he won at IMS.

The Purdue University engineering grad is clinging to his lifelong dream of winning an elusive NASCAR Cup title.

"That's always been my ultimate goal from the time I was in elementary school," Newman said last month. "That's on my radar still and will always be on my radar, whether I achieve it or not because that's just the nature of the beast when it comes to the competitiveness of what we do, so I don't know. I don't know what all the steps will be, but, ultimately, that's where my mind and heart will always want to be."

Newman continued, "I don't want to have a Mark Martin syndrome where you achieve a lot, but don't always achieve the things that you say you wanted to achieve. There are guys in our sport that have not gotten their first top-10 or top-five, and to have 18 wins and as many poles as I have is special; but it's a humbling sport and you're never probably as successful as you think you can be or should be.

He enters the IMS road course after finishing 26th Sunday at Watkins Glen among 30 cars on the lead lap.

Looking at his return to IMS where he won on the oval, Newman said, "The Brickyard 400 was really special just because I'm from Indiana, it's yard of bricks, and the brick that comes on the trophy."

Newman, 43, has not won in 160 consecutive starts. He was in contention on the last lap of the 2020 Daytona 500 until a horrid crash at the finish miraculously left him with minor injuries and a concussion. He has 18 Cup wins in 712 starts during his 22-year career.

Sitting far outside the top 16 in points, he needs to break that skid to get into the playoffs with only, Indy, MIS, and Daytona left to qualify for The Chase.

Five-time race winner Kyle Larson comes to Indy in the Cup points lead with second-place Denny Hamlin and third-place William Bryon. Chase Briscoe of Mitchell was ninth Sunday with Justin Haley of

Winamac 29th. Briscoe has three top-10 finishes, all on road courses, which makes him a bona fide top-10 threat Sunday.

"We'll go on to Indy and back home next week," Briscoe said at The Glen. "Obviously that one is super special, so we'll try to capitalize there. We know we've got to get it better if we're gonna win one of these.'

in this experience. Karam has two top-10 finishes in eight career "500" starts with team owner Dennis Reinbold, who owns an auto dealership in Greenwood. Karam posted a career-best seventh in this year's "500." He also raced in three IndyCar road races in 2020 at IMS.

The Anderson team has four top-10 finishes this season with four different drivers in the Xfinity series.

Haley was ninth in the Xfinity race Saturday at Watkins Glen where young Ty Gibbs, grandson of Joe Gibbs, took the win. Of interest, open-wheel veteran AJ Allmendinger was second and Austin Cindric, son of Team Penske president Tim Cindric, was third Sunday. Cindric, winner of four races, and two-time winner Allmendinger are

1-2 in points. Haley, winner of the 2019 NASCAR Cup Daytona 400, is seventh in Xfinity points.


# Franklin Twp. team brings home state championship

Seven-time NASCAR Cup champion Jimmie Johnson continues the transition from stock cars to the sleek and nimble Indy car this weekend at the Indianapolis

Motor Speedway. The four-time NASCAR Cup Brickyard 400 winner returns to the IMS road course, not the oval, Saturday at 1 p.m. in the Chip Ganassi Racing No. 48 Carvana Honda for the IndyCar Big Ma-chine Spiked Coolers Grand Prix. In eight non-oval races,

Johnson has yet to crack the top 15. He has been running at the finish of six races with an IndyCar Series best finish of 19th in the season opener at Birmingham. Ala. He was 24th in the Indy Grand Prix on May 1.

Johnson could be edging closer to competing in the 107th Indianapolis 500 next year. He is to test later this month on the

World Wide Technology oval in Madison, III.

Racing in the "500" was farthest from his mind earlier this year as a race-day commentator on the network telecast. He has assessed Indy-Car's improved racecar and track safety. It will eventually boil down to a family decision with his wife Chandra.

"Ultimately I'm trying to understand the safety level of the IndyCar on the ovals," Johnson said in a press conference last week in Nashville, Tenn. "That's really been my fear, from being a fan and watching from afar and watching my friends race on ovals - that's the part that's worried me

Johnson continued, "Being around the sport all season like I have, seeing a few big crashes at the Brickyard and speaking to the drivers after, I'm becoming much more comfortable with the ovals and with the crash dynamics that take place, with softer walls, the halo, the aeroscreen, the top of the car ... as I get more comfortable with that, my participation on ovals will increase."

Johnson admitted that his assessment of oval racing is "the risk versus the reward."

In the same session, he stated, "The results (road/street) aren't where I want them to be."

His latest IndyCar adventure ended early in the inaugural Big Machine Music City Grand Prix IndyCar street race that featured racing across the Korean Veterans Memorial Bridge.

Johnson was caught up in a multiple-car traffic jam with contact after completing 18 laps. Under the subsequent red flag, crew members had the car on its air jacks in the pits to check any damage which was in violation of IndyCar red-flag rules.

"I personally don't know the rules very well here; I know where I came from (NASCAR), you couldn't touch a car under a red," Johnson surmised. "I'm guessing that's the same thing here. The guys were trying to diagnose what was broken on the back of the car, the back of the transmission

Johnson continues to profess that he learns something new each time he races.

"I'm having a blast, learning all the time," Johnson contended in the face of high expectations from fans. "I think so many people are used to me winning races, racing for wins and championships, and they may not give this series or this switch the credit it deserves - just how difficult it is.

While Johnson was being interviewed, his two Ganassi teammates had a 1-2 finish with winner Ericsson who "flew and won" and runnerup Scott Dixon. Erricsson's car became airborne after he ran into Sebastian Bourdais' car on a restart on Lap 4. He returned to the frav and held off hard-charging Colton Herta, who crashed with six laps to go, for his second win of the season.

James Hinchcliffe was third, Ryan Hunter Reay fourth, and Graham Rahal fifth in the wild and unpredictable race.

Dixon, a six-time series champion, moved from third to second in points and trails leader Alex Palou by only 42 points coming to IMS. Pato O'Ward is third in points.

After the Nashville race, virtually every IndyCar driver is looking for a better finish on the more familiar IMS road course Saturday where

Rinus VeeKay finished ahead of Romain Grosjean on May 15.


The band brings the nostalgia of the former club and tunes that can be enjoyed by young and old.
