Falcons claim first county baseball championship since 2001

What's the secret to Perry Meridian's success that earned the Falcons their first Marion County baseball championship since 2001?

"We believe in us," contended power-hitting third baseman Jacob Phillips, who had three doubles and drove in three runs as the Falcons edged Speedway, 5-4 in the title game May 9 at spacious Victory Field. "It was just another day in the (batter's) box."

The Falcons made their third trip to the championship game with coach Jake Banwart but this marked the first time they brought the championship home with him. PM's last county title came 22 years ago.

They eked out a one-run triumph with 10 hits and an uncharacteristic pair of errors against the Sparkplugs.

Leading 5-3 after six innings, the 'Plugs rally in the top of the seventh ended with runners on first and second. Speedway had closed it to one run on an RBI single to right field. The Falcons made a key defensive play when catcher Aiden Kerr threw to second and caught lead-off hitter Eli Owens stealing. Falcons' relief pitcher Lane Allison closed his eighth save by striking out Carter Watson.

Then and only then could the Falcons' celebration begin on the home field of the Indianapolis Indians.

"It (championship) is cool," Phillips said. "We expected to be here and this is what we expected."

Also leading the Falcons were outfielder Brock Allison with two hits and three runs scored, Carter with two hits, and Kolton Wright with two hits and two RBI.

The Falcons managed to overcome leaving the bases loaded in the first and fifth innings.

Coach Banwart said, "We hadn't made more than one error in each of our last 10 games. We did a good job of refocusing after making a mistake. It seemed like we were always one hit away from breaking this one open, but credit to them (Speedway) for hanging in there."

The Falcons raised their record

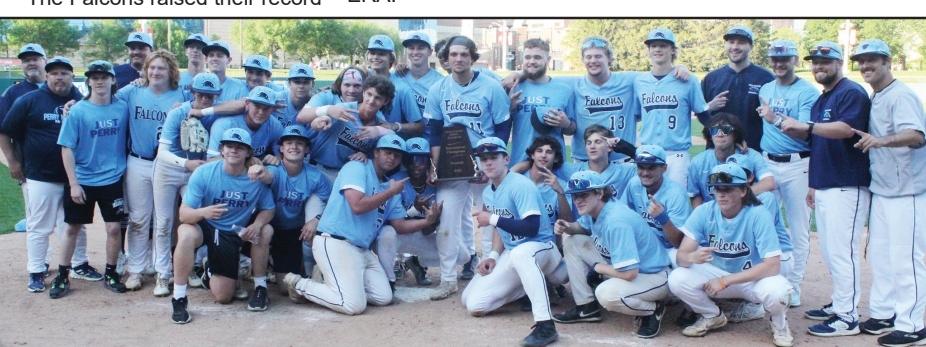
to 15-7 with their ninth straight win. PM has been in 15 games decided by three runs or less.

Banwart and the Falcons have settled on Lane Allison as the team's closer.

"Lane leads us in saves," Banwart said. "We tried to find a closer earlier in the season, and he became the one that we trust. Today even in the seventh, we weren't going to take the ball away from him (runners on first and second). He took a deep breath, refocused, and put the last batter out."

The Falcons' celebration was short-lived, losing to Whiteland, 6-1 Wednesday but recovering for a 3-2 win in eight innings Thursday against the Warriors.

Phillips leads the Falcons at the plate with a .432 batting average and 18 RBI and is 5-0 on the mound with a 2.97 ERA.

BEECH GROVE Hammack links success of city and schools together

Beech Grove City Schools Supt. Laura Hammack linked the city and the schools together as one during her remarks at a recent Greater Beech Grove Chamber of Commerce luncheon May 11 at Hornet Park Community Center.

She emphasized, "Beech Grove is one in the same -- without the city, there is no school; without the schools, the city loses its sizzle."

Hammack, who is finishing her second school year at the helm, cited the city's increase in full housing, its activity on Main Street, additional city walking trails, and the new police station under construction as assets.

She also emphasized the motto "love when you learn" by stating, "We are unapologetic in using the word 'love' if love comes first, then the rest comes together."

Hammack, who earned her doctorate at Indiana State University, also listed a Top Ten list of what makes Beech Grove City Schools special: diversity, devoted educators (20 percent of teachers and staff previously attended Beech Grove schools), academic excellence, arts, athletics, building leaders, community, facilities, safety, and fun.

She particularly acknowledged Bruce Bye as the "godfather of the FFA (Future Farmers of America)" at BGHS and for founding the agricultural education

program. The FFA at its recent banquet made her an honorary FFA member. And she made special mention of taking part in a high school art class the morning of the luncheon.

A major change ahead for high school students will be the offering of "core content" classes in the first two years and an academic emphasis on the students' special interests for various pathways during their junior and senior years.

"We have created a culture of learning for all," Hammack stated.

After her formal remarks, Hammack took questions from attendees and was asked for her "wishes" in education.

Her "dreamy wish" would be for all students who come to school feeling safe, valued, respected, and loved and that would also be the experience in the home of every student served.

Her other wish would be to find a remedy to the inequities of school funding for a more equitable way for operational (non-teaching) funding.

"This is a tough job," she concluded, "But it's the best job in the world."

Hammack had served in an administrative role with Beech Grove City Schools before serving as superintendent of Brown County Schools through the 2020-2021 school year.

Beech Grove City Schools consists of Hornet Park Early Learning Center, Central and Hornet Park elementary schools, South Grove intermediate school, and the middle and high schools.

Rossi and Rahal find optimism for '500' after road course finishes

Although they didn't win the Indy Car GMR Grand Prix Saturday, veteran drivers Alexander Rossi and Graham Rahal expressed confidence in their teams as practice began on the 2.5-mile oval Tuesday for the 107th running of the Indianapolis 500. Rossi, driving for the first season with Arrow McLaren SP, finished third to road course winner Alex Palou. Rahal, driving for Rahal Letterman Lanigan, finished a strong 10th after coming back from a Turn 1 incident with a punctured right rear tire.

The Arrow McLaren SP team placed three drivers among the top five with teammates runner-up Pato O'Ward and fifth-place Felix Rosenqvist.

Rossi was the last competitor to lead the race until Palou took the lead with 20 laps remaining on the IMS road course.

"Really looking forward to getting started on the oval," Rossi said. "Man, this is a momentum game; we talk a lot about it."

The winner of the 100th Indianapolis 500 as a rookie added, "Performance here doesn't translate the other direction, but it's good mentally for everyone. You know you've got the ability to have the results across all three cars. When everyone is relaxed and just doing what they know how to do, the confidence in their abilities is when the performance comes."

Rossi, 31, moved to Arrow McLaren SP after being with Andretti Autosport for seven years and winning seven races, including the 2022 Gallagher Grand Prix on the same Indy road course.

Rahal, who is in his 17th IndyCar campaign, and two Rahal Letterman Lanigan teammates, pole winner Christian Lundgaard and No. 4 qualifier Jack Harvey, were among the top eight for the GMR Grand Prix.

In the first turn on the first lap Saturday, Kyle Kirkwood made contact with Rahal whose Dallara-Honda wound up with a punctured tire. It dropped Rahal to 26th and a complete change in strategy.

"It turned our race into a two-stop race," said Rahal who was out of pit sequence but later led for seven laps. "We were able to finish strong."

Then he reflected, "With three cars qualified among the top eight that shows what we can do. It shows we're making progress."

Rahal's best finish in the "500" was third in 2011 and 2020. He led the race in 2021 but spun hard into the Turn 2 wall when a loose left rear tire fell off. He has raced with RLL since 2013. His father Bobby Rahal won the "500" in 1986 and Graham obviously wants the father-son duo to be the first to win since Al Unser and Al Unser Sr.

Palou and the Chip Ganassi team utilized tire strategy to win the GMR Grand Prix Saturday by nearly 17 seconds ahead of O'Ward in a rare domination of the road course race.

They are among 34 entries in the "500," including the Dreyer Reinbold Racing duo of 2014 winner Ryan Hunter-Reay and British driver Stefan Wilson.

Practice continues through Friday with qualifications Saturday to lock in positions 13-30 with the front four rows and the last row to be determined Sunday.

Carb Day is May 26 and Race Day is May 28.

So what does it take to win the "500?" Palou had the answer.

"You need the perfect, perfect day," he said Saturday. "Just having a good day is not enough here."

Greenwood slates 2023 Summer Concert Series



The City of Greenwood's popular Summer Concert Series is set to return on June 3 and will continue into August.

Following the final concert, the Fall Concert Series will kick off just a few weeks later and continue through mid-October.

Nearly every Saturday between June and August, and again from late September through mid-October, the Greenwood Amphitheater will come alive with music. The performances, which cover a variety of musical genres ranging from country to pop and rock, attract streams of Greenwood residents, families and visitors, many of whom bring lawn chairs, blankets and snack-filled coolers to create a fun, lively and welcoming atmosphere.

In 2022, Greenwood's Parks and Recreation Department welcomed approximately 12,000 attendees to the amphitheater for the summer series and approximately 4,000 attendees for the fall series that resumes this year.

"The annual concert series is a cornerstone of the summer and fall months here in Greenwood as it provides residents and visitors the chance to come together outdoors and enjoy the community," said Greenwood Mayor Mark W. Select food trucks will be present at each concert, including Mo Bowl, Johnsons Barbecue, Happy Tacos, Chompz, Bearded Burger, Smokehouse BBQ, Marco's Pizza and/or Brozinni Pizza, along with Jones Kettle Corn and Kona Ice.

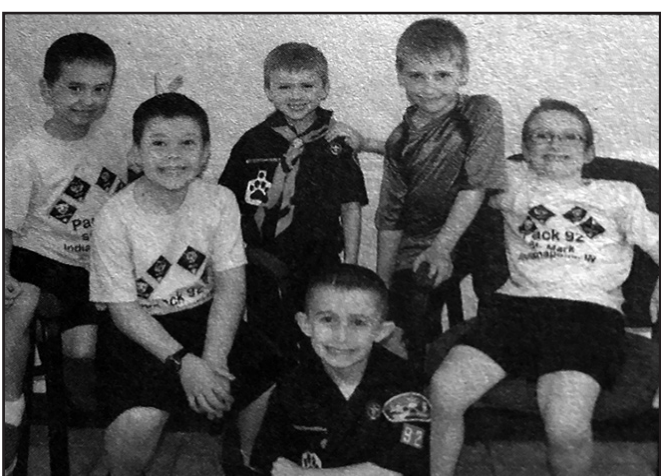

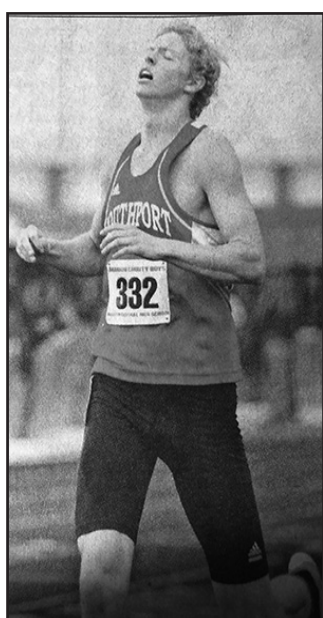

Traveling I-465 to become more tricky for motorists soon

Motorists on the Southside will find it more challenging to travel on I-465 as improvements begin this summer.

The changes to I-465 will change the landscape between I-65 and I-70 and I-465 between Harding Street and White River as I-69 links to the Southside.

Temporary directional closures and ramp closures will be taking place, beginning in June. INDOT encourages motorists to plan their travel by seeking alternate routes.

The first closure is scheduled for June 2-21. During these three weeks, eastbound lanes and ramps of I-465 will be closed between I-65 and I-70.

The second closure is scheduled for July 7-29. This construction will close the westbound lanes and ramps of I-465 between I-65 and I-70.

Beginning June 2, I-465 eastbound exits will be fully closed to traffic between I-65 and I-70. The detour for I-465 eastbound traffic will follow I-70 eastbound to I-65 southbound in the south split.

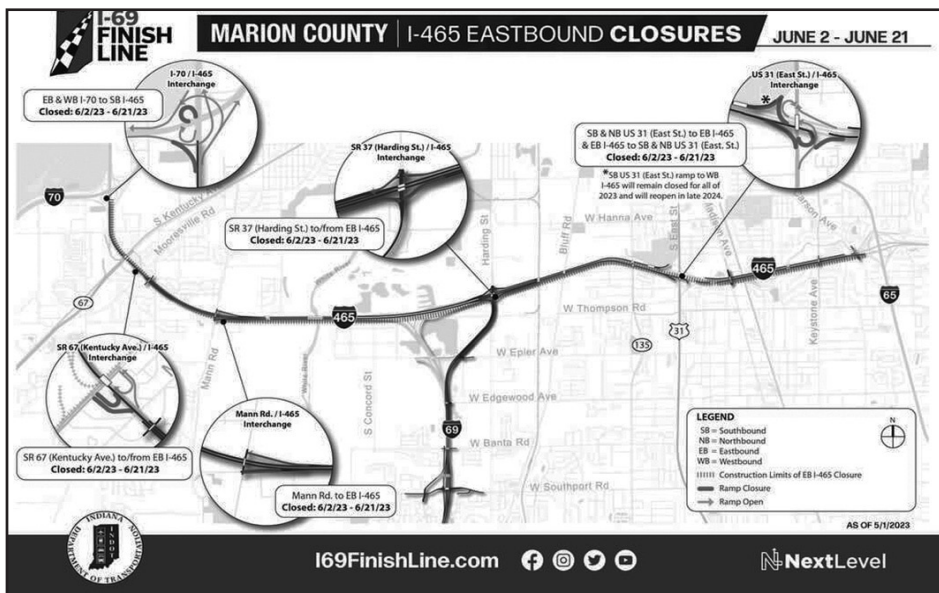
The following ramps will be closed for the duration of the closure:

*I-70 east and westbound to I-465 westbound.

*Kentucky Avenue / State Road 67 / to / from I-465 eastbound.

*Mann Road to I-465 eastbound.

*Harding St. / State Road 37 / from I-465 eastbound.



*East Street / U.S. 31 to / from I-465 eastbound.

These I-465 improvements are all designed to benefit drivers by adding capacity to I-465 between I-65 and I-70 in the safest, most efficient way possible, according to INDOT.

Recently, crews have closed Bluff Road under I-465 for bridge demolition, the latest bridge to be taken down as part of the 169 Finish Line project and to add capacity to the

eastbound lanes of I-465. Nightly stoppages for a few minutes have been in effect for bridge and material removal overhead.

INDOT is using the State Road 37 foot-print for I-69 with a new interchange east of White River for direct access from I-465 and a remodel of the Harding Street interchange for continued access to local businesses.

Actual starting dates and duration for work and any closures may be adjusted due to inclement weather or unforeseen delays.

Roncalli senior Lyla Blackwell has a habit of clicking her heels before touching home plate to score a run for the Royals.

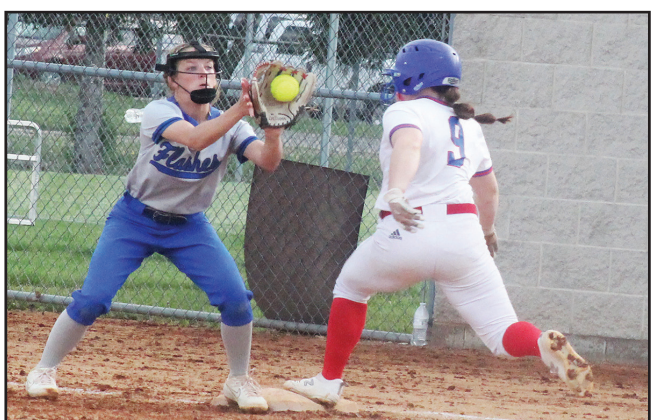

Smith, the Great Lakes Valley Conference Pitcher of the Year, lived up to her honor with her stamina against Lewis in the Midwest Regional.

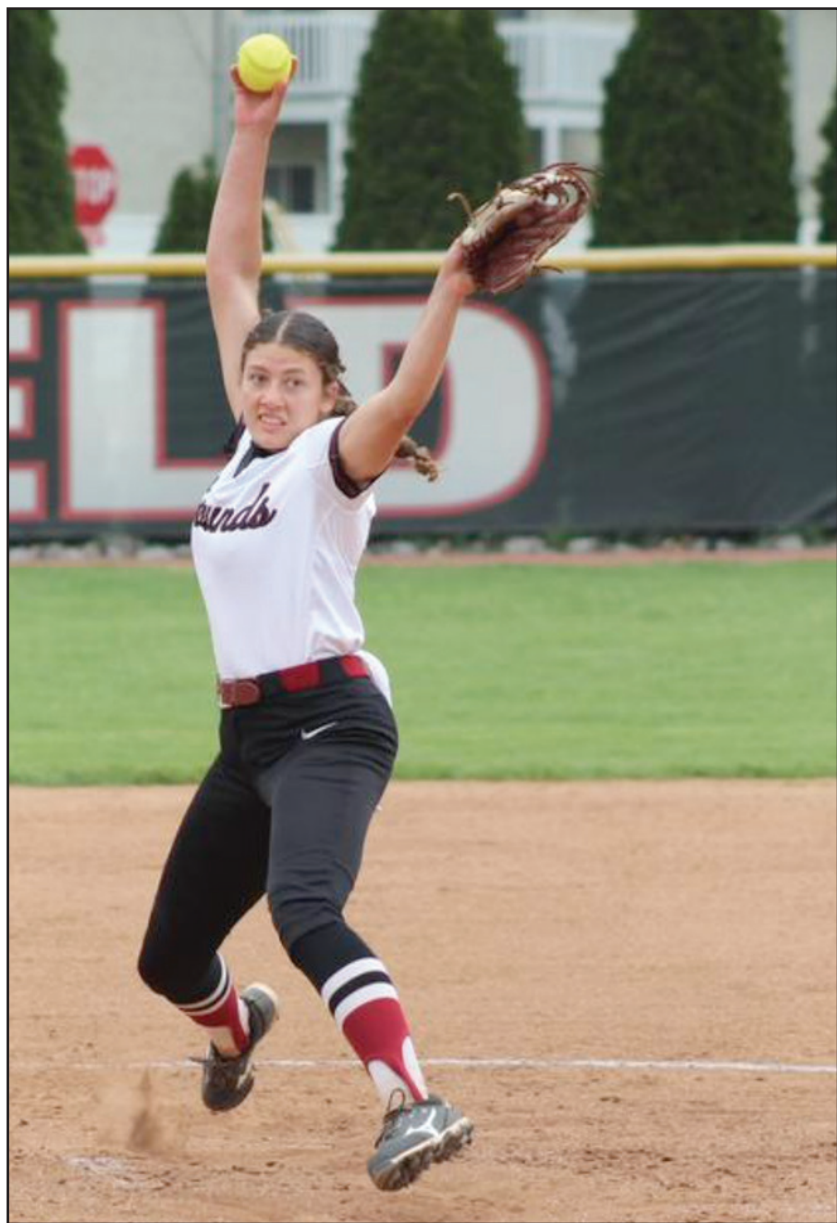
She came off an 11-inning complete game Friday against Lewis when she threw 183 pitches.

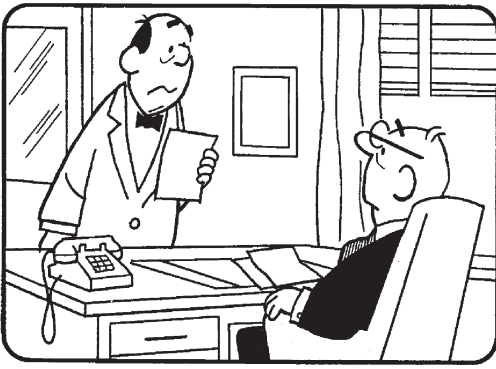

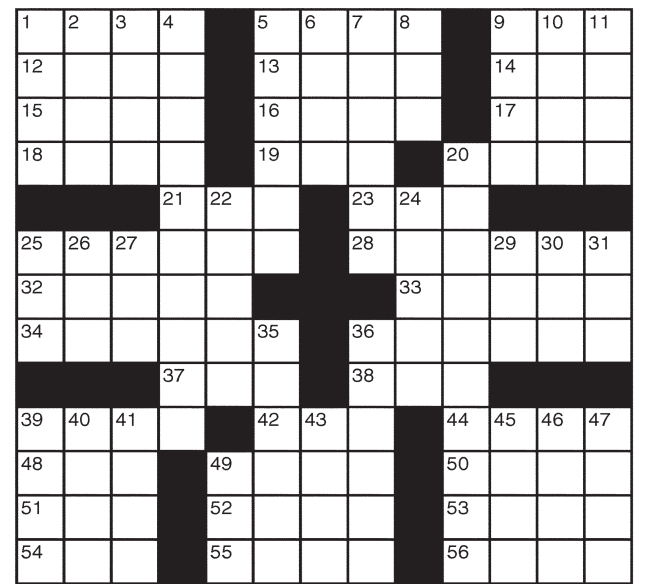
