Tennis player eyeing next season

Perry Meridian sophomore Sajin Smith advanced to state

Perry Meridian state finalist Sajin Smith will be more determined next season when he returns to the tennis court for the Falcons.

In only his second year with the Falcons, Smith continued the family tennis heritage by competing in the state finals Oct. 20 at Park Tudor. Smith gamely battled Bloomington North senior Mac Rogers 4-4 in the first set before losing 6-4 and dropping the second set 6-1.

"I hope I can get here again," Smith, a sophomore, said. "I really had a great season; it was fun."

Smith is coached at Perry Meridian by Richard Lord and mentored year-round by his father, Bryan Smith, a two-time IHSAA singles champion as a sophomore and senior at Center Grove. His son was attempting to be the fifth Southside netter to claim a state title and the first since Chris Herron of Greenwood in 2006.

"Being here and not going farther will be an easy motivational tool for him," Bryan Smith said. "He's going to want to get back here and do better, so he can have a better result the next time."

Smith played in front of many relatives, including a great uncle and great aunt from Fort Worth, Texas, and teammates in the opening round of the state finals.

He opened by winning the first game on his serve and fighting through two ties to go ahead 3-2 and 4-3. He won the fifth game by aggressively coming from behind 40-15 and eventually scoring the final three points. He

dominated the seventh game and won it with an ace.

Smith then lost the next three games on a double fault and two returns that went out of bounds. He trailed in each of those games 40-15, leaving no room for error.

"He saw the momentum shift and made some errors that he usually doesn't make," Smith's father said. "If he had won after that tie (4-4), maybe the match becomes different. This is such a different environment."

Smith lost the first three games in the second set but recovered with a well-placed shot to win the fourth game. Rogers, a senior,

Retired Perry teacher recognized for advocacy of education, human rights

Reba Boyd Wooden has received an Indiana Woman of Achievement Award from Ball State University's College of Sciences and Humanities.

Wooden, a teacher and guidance counselor at Perry Meridian High School for 31 years before retiring in 2005, was recognized during a dinner Oct. 18 on the BSU campus for her advocacy of education and civil and human rights.

BSU biology Professor Emeritus Alice Bennett nominated Wooden, writing that her efforts have resulted in outstanding contributions to life in Indiana.

As a public school teacher she was coordinator of the Challenge Education program, which aided in the integration process with the beginning of court-ordered busing of inner-city students to Indianapolis' suburban schools in 1981.

She presently serves as president of Health, Access and Privacy Alliance, nonprofit consortium working to improve access to health-care and protect reproductive choice in Indiana.

Wooden's peers know her as a deeply committed, focused and effective advocate.

Previous winners have included judges, a university president, scientists, educators, artists, community leaders and public servants. In each case, these are women who make the world better because of what they do and have done.

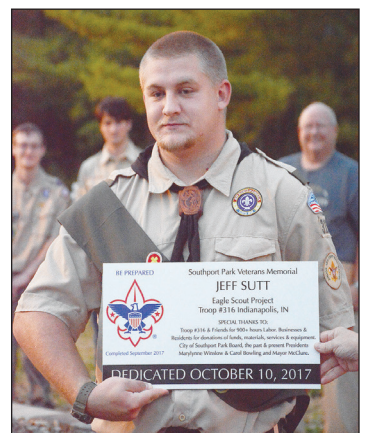
Southport Park now features veterans memorial

Franklin Central senior wins \$2,500 scholarship

Franklin Central senior Bode Hoover was named a recipient of the Paul M. Chase Memorial Prize Sunday at Eagle Creek Park.

Hoover won a \$2,500 scholarship for demonstrating a bold interest in a service-oriented career while exemplifying intelligence, character and compassion.

Hoover, an Advanced Placement scholar with distinction and a delegate to Boy's State, has thrived in school and aspires to be a microbiologist, seeking to use his skills to solve a big challenge like Ebola.

He is the founder of Project Puggrade, a nonprofit that raises funds for animal protection, is active in the school's service and academic clubs, has helped to develop Little Free Libraries as a regional leader for Key Club and volunteers at a local pantry.

"In a time where there is so much conflict, negativity and polarization in our society, Bode is such a positive, dynamic and can-do young leader," remarked Jesse Kharbanda, founder of the prize and executive director of the Hoosier Environmental Council.

The prize is named after Paul Mitchell Chase (1955-2014), a public interest lawyer and humanitarian who was killed in a car accident.

Historical marker dedicated

A historical marker about the "lost" town of Gallaudet was dedicated Saturday during a special event sponsored by the Franklin Township Historical Society, which had the marker erected.

The marker, titled "Gallaudet Station: The Town That Never Happened," is located at 5605 S. Franklin Road. The unveiling featured special speakers and a catered luncheon.

The town of Gallaudet was the idea of mid-1800s landowner James S. Brown, a Franklin Township resident who was superintendent of the Indiana School for the Deaf. Brown named his town for Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet, co-founder of the first school for the deaf in North America.

A post office was established there in January 1854, and Indianapolis & Cincinnati Railroad trains dropped mail at the depot twice a day. A store, a coal yard and sawmill were established, but Brown's hoped-for town never fully developed.

Local historian and author Sylvia C. Henricks, a longtime president of the society, is mentioned on the marker. She died earlier this year just short of her 95th birthday. Her granddaughters, Samatha and Molly Hansen, helped to unveil the marker.

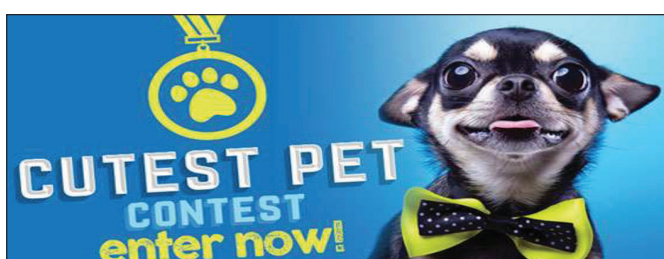

Eskenazi Health provides health-care insurance advice and options

With open marketplace enrollment on the horizon, central Indiana residents without health insurance – and those looking for the latest information regarding the confusing health-care insurance scene – are encouraged to visit Eskenazi Health for the best advice.

Open marketplace enrollment runs Nov. 1 through Dec. 15, and outside of that period, generally enrolling in a health insurance plan can only be done if a person qualifies for a special enrollment period, such as a life event: marriage, the birth of a child or change in health insurance coverage.

On Saturday, Nov. 18, the Sidney & Lois Eskenazi Hospital and Eskenazi Health campus will host a special opportunity for eligible residents to access various health coverage opportunities.

Our health-care navigators will assist hundreds of people, and information about the Children's Health Insurance Program will be available. CHIP is an initiative designed to provide insurance coverage to children whose families earn too much to qualify for Medical Assistance but who cannot afford private insurance.

The event comes during the midst of Enroll Indianapolis Day at Eskenazi Health, which will allow the public to learn about options offered through the Affordable Care Act, Healthy Indiana Plan – HIP 2.0 and to sign up on-site for one of the marketplace insurance plans. The event will run from 8 a.m.-to 5 p.m. at the hospital, 720 Eskenazi Ave. Free parking will be available.

The event allows people to learn about the various options before the deadline for fall enrollment. Those attending will receive a free health insurance information.

Eskenazi Health has a dedicated staff of more than 60 navigators to assist with health insurance enrollment, and a toll-free phone number – 1-855-202-1053 – is available to connect with staff who can answer questions and provide assistance in using the online marketplace.

The marketplace is designed to provide uninsured Hoosiers with access to plans being made available. More information is available at www.healthcare.gov/.

Southport is building city center

The Southport Police Department and city officials have broken ground on an 8,000-square-foot municipal complex at 137 Worman St. The new facility will replace the one at 6901 Derbyshire Road, which houses city offices and Perry Senior Services while serving as a community center.

Police Chief Thomas Vaughn's office is an 8-by-10-foot space, which contains filing cabinets used for storage.

"The roll call room is utilized by other agencies, for breathalyzers, fingerprints and people picking up police reports," Vaughn said. "You'll have someone doing a breathalyzer on a drunk, with someone getting their fingerprints for their government job and then a child sitting at a desk coloring in a coloring book. In today's society those things are not acceptable."

The initial idea was for the building's use to be limited to the police station, but that evolved. The facility will now house the offices of city officials and a meeting room for the City Council, which approved the

\$1 million project, funded by a bond. June 30 is estimated completion date.

The building will feature secured entries, but there will always be access to a safe room for those in trouble to contact the police.

The current community center, which can be rented for events, will not be abandoned. Perry Senior Services will continue to call it home, and space has been offered to the Lions Club of Southport for its meetings.

Four Southsiders in state cross-country finals

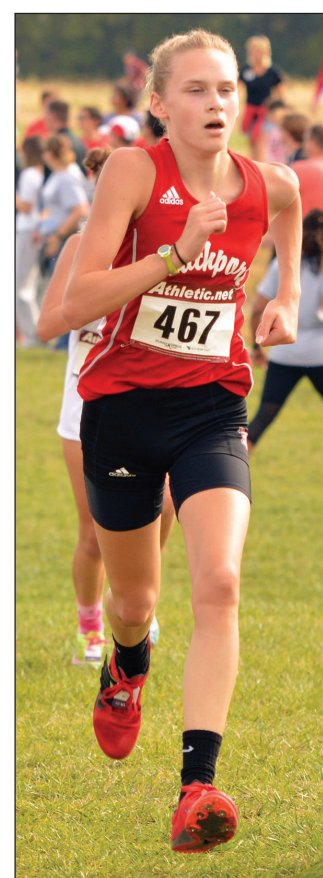

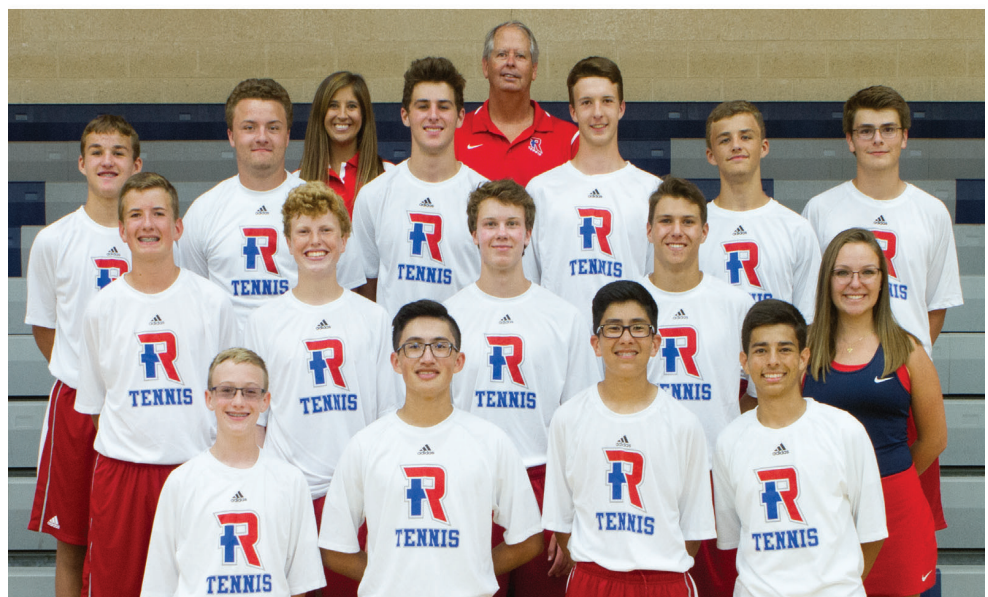

Personal Recollections

I was recently talking with a friend and our discussion turned to our first jobs. I delivered newspapers for *The Indianapolis News* when I attended Edgewood Grade School.

Last week I drove one of those routes exactly as I had ridden my bicycle to deliver those papers. I was amazed that I could still name a lot of the families that resided in those houses on my route.

This route covered streets between Epler Avenue and Thompson Road and east of Madison Avenue. Two of my Edgewood teachers resided on Epler Avenue, and about 10 of my classmates lived in the area. All of *The Star/News* carriers picked up their papers at a blue metal building behind the drugstore at Epler and Madison avenues. The Rev. Walter Barth, pastor of the church at Dudley Avenue and Shelby Street, was in charge of our paper station, which was equipped with a wood-burning stove. He always kept the building warm in the winter.

We went directly to the paper station after being dismissed from school. I'm sure that our customers kept an eye out for us as we ran our routes.

Since we didn't have plastic bags to protect the papers from bad weather, we put them on covered porches or between a storm door and the solid front door. We never tossed papers onto yards or driveways. The fall and winter holidays were lots of fun for us carriers. We always did a dual visit close to Halloween. We collected the 30 cents for the paper and would often trick-or-treat at that time. Sometimes we received special treats.

Delivering papers on Thanksgiving always took a lot of extra

time. Some of my customers invited me in for something to eat. By the time I was finished with my route, my saddlebags, which normally held newspapers, were full of goodies, including turkey and pie.

Christmas was also special. Our customers always took good care of us carriers. I got cards with cash presents and boxes of chocolate-covered cherries; I remember having more than a dozen boxes stacked on our kitchen counter one year. I always purchase chocolate-covered cherries at Christmas-time because they bring back so many special memories. (*Editor's note: Some of those boxes were dropped off to staff members at The Southsider Voice.*)

A few years later several of my friends, Larrie and Mickey Johnson, and I had morning *Indianapolis Star* routes. I didn't have the same close connection with my customers that I did with my afternoon route. No one was awake when we delivered those papers, and it was still dark for better than half of the year when we were peddling papers.

Larrie told me that Mickey didn't really enjoy being out early in the morning when it was dark. One morning we finished our routes extra-fast and rode our bicycles a few blocks south on Madison to hide and see what Mickey was doing.

He came riding past us, and I was surprised to hear him talking to himself. He was saying, "Come on Mick, only five more stops. You can do it."

I think our original plan was to frighten him, but we were so surprised to hear him conversing with himself that we stayed quiet ... at least until he was out of hearing range so that we could start laughing.

Those were the days!

He can carry a football and a tune

Greenwood senior Brandon Rosado sings a sweet song whether toting a pigskin or singing with the school's award-winning Rhapsody choir.

Rosado and senior linemen Zach Drew and Joey Craig have been singing under the direction of 16th-year music director Dan Borns since the eighth grade.

"He (Borns) talked us into it, and we decided we might as well try it," Rosado said. "He let us get a feel for it before high school."

Since then Rosado has done his fair share of recruiting other guys for choir, and he aspires to be a music major and play football in college.

He and fellow Rhapsody member, senior Ethan Pine, had a busy weekend.

Rosado, a 5-4, 175-pound running back, gained 76 yards in nine carries and scored a touchdown as No. 11 Greenwood dominated Beech Grove 43-7 Friday night in the first round of 4A Sectional 22.

Pine finished 36th in the Shelbyville Semistate with a time of 16 minutes, 19.2 seconds over the 5K course.

They are among 40 male singers in the coed chorus. Greenwood's choral program is known for being among the state's best. Rhapsody under Borns has won numerous state honors and has grown to nearly 250 students in Grades 9-12.

Instead of hanging out with friends or playing video games, Rosado and Pine joined choir members Sunday for a combined concert with University of Indianapolis choruses at the DeHaan Fine Arts Center.

Rosado didn't quite compare the center to Lucas Oil Stadium, site of the state finals, but admitted that performing in the Ruth Lilly Performance Hall again was amazing with its excellent acoustics and capacity crowd.

"We love to sing in front of huge audiences," he said. "The music we sing is really great, and Mr. Borns makes it fun."

Rosado has a great desire to perform in the auditorium or on the football field. He realizes that it takes practice and that Borns and football coach Mike Campbell parallel each other in their expectations.

"It's a lot mental; you have to have your head into both," Rosado

said. "It's all about practice, practice, practice. When you sing you're thinking ahead, and when you're running with the ball you have to think about the hole you hit and your strengths."

Rosado feels prepared whether he's singing Zigeunerleben in German, making sounds that imitate a Brazilian rain forest or preparing to make a block for his teammates.

He said Borns pushes him to perform just as hard as Campbell pushes him on the football field.

Rosado suffered a high ankle sprain Sept. 22 against Paoli. A few days later he performed at the Greenwood Music Department's fall concert wearing a protective boot on his left ankle. He stood and sang with Rhapsody while still in pain.

He returned to the field briefly against Whiteland in the team's last regular-season win and then helped the ground game against Beech Grove.

Junior running back Nick Willham had 12 carries, gained 92 yards and scored a touchdown in the first quarter on a 35-yard run for a quick 23-0 lead.

The Woodmen were led by the one-two combo of Rosado and Willham in the backfield and the passing attack of senior quarterback Seth Gallman and Conner Battinau, who combined on a 17-yard TD in the second quarter.

Rosado has gained 666 yards this season and is averaging 5.8 yards per carry; he has scored eight touchdowns.

The Woodmen (8-2) face Mount Vernon (4-6) Friday at Woodman Field with the winner going to the Sectional 22 final against Mooresville or New Castle.

"We still have a lot of work to get ready for Mount Vernon," Campbell said. "We tell our kids we're not playing for titles; we're playing as a family because we want to practice together for one more week."

In 6A, a showdown looms Friday with No. 13 Center Grove (4-5) at No. 14 Franklin Central (8-1). Perry Meridian (1-8) is at No. 8 Brownsburg and Avon is at Southport.

In 5A, No. 3 Roncalli (8-1) meets No. 1 Cathedral (4-5) at Tech in a big rivalry with high stakes.

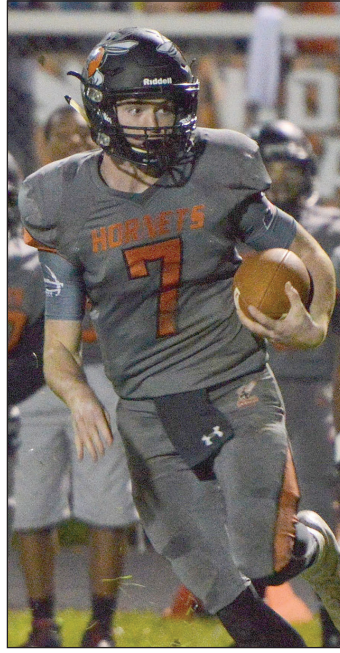
In Class A, No. 2 Lutheran, which rolled over Cambridge City Lincoln 54-16, meets South Decatur (5-5).
